SCHOOL DEPOSITS SHOW INCREASE

Total in Past Two Months Is More Than Double of Former Years.

TRAFALGAR FIRST

Deposits from London public schools in the Penny Bank of Canada have shown large increases for the months of March and April. For March there was over \$2,500 more deposited during March of this year than for the same month last year. During April there was nearly \$1,000 more than for the same month in 1923.

In London schools deposits during March for the last three years have been: 1922, \$1,610.89; 1923, \$1,615.33; 1924, \$4,205.11. For the month of April over the same period the deposits were: 1922, \$1,292.77; 1923, \$1,673.21; 1924, \$2,571.32.

For March and April of this year children of Canadian schools loaned \$100,877.93 to the government. Average deposits for the pupils of 20 public schools of London was 48 cents per month during March and April. This stands up well in comparison with the average for all the Dominion of 39 cents.

Trafalgar School pupils led the others with an average of 84 cents. This is a high mark for any school in Canada. Cornwall led other school centers in the Dominion with an average of \$1.14, far above any other.

Average deposits for London schools were: Aberdeen, 44 cents; Alexandra, 37; Boyle Memorial, 41; Chesley, 26; Ealing, 34; Empress, 55; Knollwood Park, 61; Lord Roberts, 44; Lorne Avenue, 31; Pottersburg, 28; Rectory Street, 27; Riverview, 78; Ryerson, 50; Simcoe, 72; St. George's, 73; Talbot Street, 46; Tecumseh, 71; Trafalgar, 84; Victoria, 24; Wortley Road, 41.

ICE BREAKING UP, M'MILLAN RADIOS FROM THE ARCTIC

Noted Explorer Preparing To Move Soon From Icebound Refuge Harbor.

LOTS OF DAYLIGHT

Experiment of Taking Wireless Into Far North Declared Great Success.

Donald B. MacMillan, explorer and Arctic radio expert of The Advertiser and the North American Newspaper Alliance, is preparing to move within a short time from ice-bound Refuge Harbor, in the north of Greenland. This is the word brought by the latest radio message to be received from his vessel, the Bowdoin, which sailed north last summer carrying radio equipment into the Arctic for the first extended experiment in air communication to and from polar regions.

That MacMillan's latest message got through to this continent in spite of increasing daylight is cited by the success of his experiment.

The message, picked up in Canada, was relayed to Hiram Percy Smith, president of the American Radio Relay League, at Hartford, Connecticut. It reads:

"We are having good weather here now. Daylight most of the time now. Temperatures are around and thawing. Ice breaking up. Expect to start home soon now. All well."

The message was picked up at its terminal by S. Kruse, operator of amateur station 10A and 1XQ at Silverlane, Connecticut, just outside of Hartford.

It reaches Kruse from amateur station 3HG, operated by G. L. Deichman of Baltimore, Maryland, and was routed to Hartford through Canadian stations 4RR and 9FB.

As finally received at Hartford, the radiogram did not make clear which Canadian station actually made contact with the Bowdoin.

During his many months in the Arctic MacMillan has frequently been in communication with radio stations and has reported that the rigors of Arctic exploration were mitigated to a great extent by the reception of radio messages and broadcast features.

MacMillan's operator is Donald Mix, who was chosen by many members of the American Radio Relay League.

NEAR EXPLAINS HOUSE SHAKING

Says Badly Fitted Car Track Joins Cause Cars To Jar Ground.

The complaints registered by the residents of the Wharncliffe road north and on Adelaide street, from Pall Mall to Oxford streets, as to the noise and the shaking of houses caused by the street cars, is due, says the city engineer, to the fact that the joints of the rails on these streets do not fit and that as the cars jump over them they jar the houses at the side of the road.

At the present time, the street railway has gangs busy on Richmond street and the Hamilton road taking out these badly-fitting joints and putting in new pieces of rail and welding the new piece to the old rails, thus removing the cause of the jarring and of noise.

Engineer Near asserts that on streets with a concrete pavement these repairs are practically a permanent job, as the thick bed of concrete, with a very small range of temperature, protects the rails from expansion and contraction to a certain extent, and that the rails will remain in place by the majority of cases through winter and summer heat.

On the Wharncliffe road, where the rails are lying on the old ties, many of which are rotten, the repairs are of a temporary nature at best, and may have to be made every year. The question was brought up by Alderman Forrester last night at the council meeting, and the engineer was instructed to see what might be done to remove the annoyance.

Mr. Forrester has previously attended similar conventions held at Chicago, New York and San Francisco. Among the subjects to be discussed at the Buffalo convention are: Grade crossings, maximum train loads, improvement of efficiency at terminals, and elimination of train and yard accidents.

PARTY WILL BRAVE WRANGEL DANGER

Carl Lomen Heads Expedition To See If Charles Wells and Companions Alive.

Nome, Alaska, June 16.—A new expedition will brave the Arctic this summer to Wrangel Island, North of Siberia and will leave a memorial at the grave of Lorne E. Knight, who was one of the four men who perished on a previous expedition. His sole companion, Ada Blackjack, was brought back to civilization last year by a relief expedition headed by Harold Noice, whose dramatic account attracted widespread attention when published in The Advertiser.

The new expedition announced today is the project of Carl Lomen of Nome, Alaska, head of the great reindeer industry of Alaska. Vilhjelm Stefansson, the explorer, who has been active for several years in trying to hold Wrangel Island as a British territory, has disposed of his interests in Wrangel Island to Lomen. On the island a party composed of Charles Wells and thirteen Eskimos was left by the relief expedition of last year. This year's venture will determine whether the Wells party, which was fully equipped, has survived or whether it has met the fate of Knight and his companions on the bleak isle around which many others perished in the past.

One reason for the present leadership of Lomen is the necessity of sending an expedition this year and determining which determined Lomen to become, for the time being, king of Wrangel Island.

Carl Lomen is the son of G. J. Lomen, former mayor and federal official, one of the first to reach Nome in the gold rush of 1900. The Lomen family has been active in the development of Alaska.

RUSSIANS OF OPINION CZAR'S ASHES FOUND

Hope Remains May Some Day Rest in Native Soil.

Russians in Paris are newly inspired by a hope that one day the ashes of their former Czar may be laid in a fitting monument on Russian soil. There are many thousands of Russians who are refugees in Paris and among whom has been aroused a feverish interest by the statement of General Janin, former head of the French Mission to Siberia, that in 1920 he brought to the Czar's country the remains of the murdered Czar Nicholas and his family. The remains are supposed to be in the hands of Grand Duke Nicholas, who some day hopes to see them suitably honored in his native land.

Some credence has been given previous statements that the remains of the Czar had been brought to France, but General Janin throws a new light on the affair in his statement that on several occasions prior to his murder, the life of the Czar could have been saved by the Czar's own general staff. General Janin states that the ashes were confided to him by General Diederichs and M. Gillard, tutor of the Czar's children at Harbin, from whence he brought them to France.

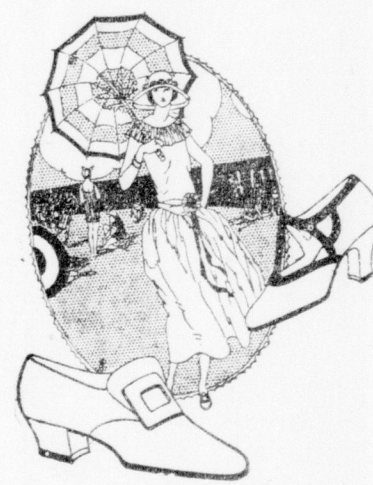

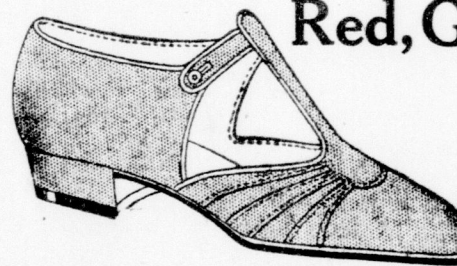
