

## TRAFALGAR SCHOOL WILL CELEBRATE TRAFALGAR DAY

Mounting of Copper Tablet From Keel of Nelson's Ship Will Be Feature.

### TO RAISE FLAG

Trafalgar school is the only school in the city which can claim Trafalgar Day as its very own. Not only does this school bear the name of the famous historical event, but it is the proud possessor of a copper tablet taken from the keel of Nelson's flagship, a fitting memorial of the great victory of Oct. 21, 1805.

Principal L. D. McCamus of the school is therefore arranging a special ceremony to take place at the school on the anniversary of Trafalgar Day, which falls on Tuesday next. On this occasion the bronze tablet from the keel of Nelson's ship will be mounted on the wall of the school.

A short service at 2 o'clock will be conducted by the Rev. Roy Mess, recently appointed chaplain of No. 1133, Trafalgar school cadet corps.

The ceremony will include the raising of the school flag, while the children gathered in the yard will sing "Rule Britannia" and the national anthem.

The appointment of Rev. Mr. Mess, who was decorated with a military medal on the field in France, was made by the school board.

As chaplain of the school, coming from the office of Lieut.-Col. G. H. Gillespie, inspector of cadet services in military district No. 1.

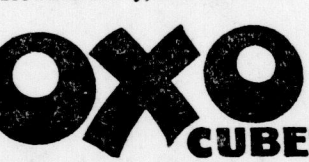
