

Important Changes on Letters and Printed Matter Are Announced.

Several important changes in postige rates were announced by the postal department at Ottawa this morning through T. Duncan, postmaster here. The new rates are effective Oct. 1.

Letters posted to all points in Canada and the North American continent will take three cents for the first ounce and two cents for each additional ounce. To Great Britain and all other places in the British Empire except North America, the rate will be four cents for the first ounce and three cents for each additional

Britain within the empire and to places in the North American continent will carry a two-cent stamp. To other countries the postage will be

United States and Mexico will carry States and Mexico will be one cent for two ounces. All other countries two cents per two ounces. Literature for the blind will be car-


