For street coats, mink, broad tail, caracul and squirrel seem most popular. Caracul, which dyes so wonderfully, is often bandied, collared and cuffed with white fur.

## DETROIT DEPARTMENT MAY HAVE NEW HEAD

Former Secret Service Man  
Undecided As To Accepting  
Mayor's Offer.

Detroit, Nov. 4.—A change in the police administration of Detroit is forecast by the statement made today by Joseph A. Palma, former chief of the United States secret service for Michigan and now chief operative for the government, to the effect that he had been offered the police commissionership by Mayor John W. Smith.

Mr. Palma is now in Detroit, having come here, he explained, "to vote and maintain a residence." "I have not decided to take the job," said Mr. Palma. "I will know within a very few days whether I will take it. The one thing that will bring me here as police commissioner is the love I have for Detroit and its people. I do not want to get into politics. I have been out of it for a long time, and I know that the police commissioner is more or less connected with political activity."

Frank H. Croul, veteran head of the police department, said today he has been assured by Mayor Smith he will not be supplanted as commissioner. "There is nothing to it. I can be police commissioner as long as I want to be, and I have no intention of quitting," said Mr. Croul.

## OBSCURE MAN RISES TO FAME IN ELECTION

Buffalo Gets Jolt When Henry  
Naylor's "Long Shots"  
Win.

Buffalo, Nov. 5.—A new figure looms up on the horizon of western New York politics in the person of Henry M. Naylor. Hitherto little known outside his own bailiwick, this man is commanding as much or more attention than the winners in the city's non-partisan election yesterday.

In Tuesday's non-partisan election, Naylor supported Frank N. Schwab, mayor of Buffalo and a Republican, who was re-elected to the majority by the largest vote ever given a municipal candidate under the charter form of government. He supported and directed the campaign of James P. Moore, a Republican, for the four-year term in the city council, and Moore was elected to the surprise of the city. Even more surprising was the victory of John J. Love, a Democrat, for the two-year council term. He also had Naylor's support.

Before the Volstead act was enacted Naylor was engaged in the distilling liquor business and is reported to have accumulated a fortune numbered in the millions of dollars.

## DRYS OF NEW ZEALAND LOSE IN LATEST DRIVE

Island Wets Cast 277,981  
Votes to 310,596 Ballots  
of Prohibitionists.

Wellington, New Zealand, Nov. 5.—Prohibitionists have not yet succeeded in their efforts to make New Zealand dry.

The question whether New Zealand should continue its present liquor license system, adopted "state purchase," or government control of liquor, or swing to prohibition, was voted on in a referendum during yesterday's general elections. The counting of the vote is as yet incomplete, but the results thus far ascertained show approximately that the prohibitionists cast 277,981 votes as against 310,596 by their opponents.

In the parliamentary election the government won a decisive victory. Premier Coates obtaining a good majority in the next parliament. On the first count it was thought that the New Zealand parliament was to have its first woman member in Miss McMillan. A recount of the vote, however, showed that she had been defeated for the seat for Grey Lynn by the Laborite candidate.

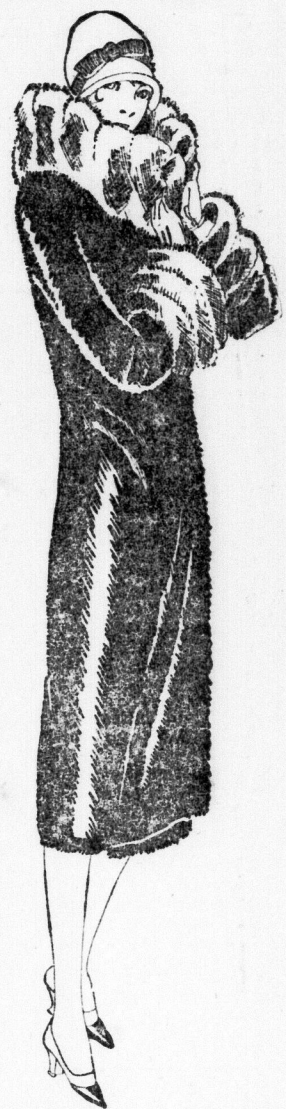

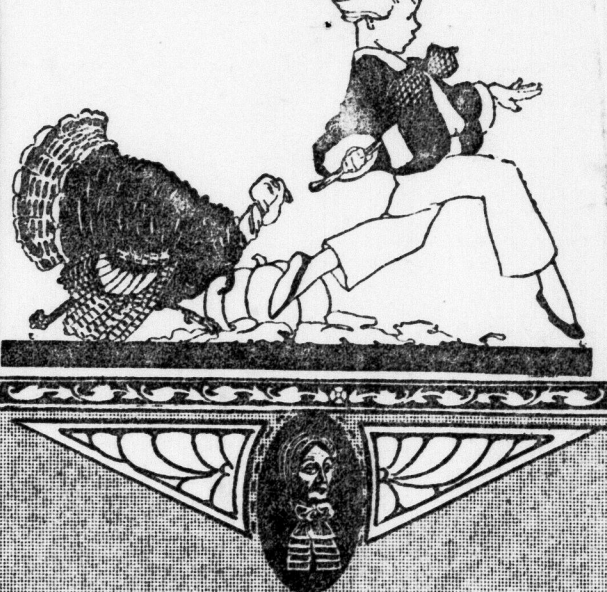
