

GOOD RESULTS OF ARBITRATION

Hon. A. B. Aylesworth Reviews Incidents of Fisheries Case In Address to the Canadian Club at the Capital

VERDICT SATISFACTORY TO BOTH PARTIES

Contrast With Outcome of Alaska Boundary Arbitration—Recent Increase in Cordiality of Relations

OTTAWA, Oct. 15.—How greatly the Canadian-American relations have increased in cordiality was manifested today when Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, minister of fisheries, addressed the Canadian club on the subject of the recent fisheries arbitration at the Hague.

Eight years ago Mr. Aylesworth returned from London, where he had been a member of the tribunal in the Alaska boundary dispute. Canada was then successful, both toward the United States and toward England, who had voted with the Americans.

Mr. Aylesworth attributed first to the excellence of the Canadian case and to the thoroughness of its presentation. For this he gives primary credit to John Ewart, K. C., who went to London before the arbitration and had defended his time exclusively to the case.

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AIRSHIP VOYAGE ACROSS OCEAN

Walter Wellman and His Assistants Embark in Dirigible Balloon—America for First Time Across Atlantic

ARE WELL FORTIFIED AGAINST ACCIDENT

Latest Wireless Messages From Voyagers Report Them Proceeding Off Coast Fifteen Miles an Hour

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 15
