

## CANADA'S TRADE

ion Mark for Year Will Be Easily Exceeded

Ottawa, January 23.— During Deember last the aggregate trade of Canada reached \$94,845,000, as against \$76,904,000 in December, 1911, an ncrease of over 23 per cent. During the nine months ending December 31 last the aggregate trade was \$808,460,000 so that Hon. W. T. White's prophecy that the year's trade will exceed the billion mark will be easily fulfilled. The trade during the corresponding peroid of 1911 was

\$647,519,000 an increase of 24 per cent. Imports entered for consumption last December were \$51,142,000 as against \$43,424,000 in December, 1911. The increase thus is 17 per cent. The imports for the nine months were \$496,692,000, as against \$382,451,000 in the corresponding period of 1911, the increase being 30

Exports during December last were \$38,658,000, an increase of 25 per cent. over the \$30.889,000 of December, 1911. For the nine months ending December 31, 1912, the exports of domestic produce were \$278,-
