### WOMEN'S INSTITUTE APPOINT DELEGATES

#### Local Ladies Will Attend Meeting of Institute at Fredericton

A meeting of the local branch of the Women's Institute was held in the Council Chambers, Monday evening, and many important matters were discussed, among which were the necessity of planting trees along our streets. This subject was given a good deal of attention, and it was the unanimous opinion that shade trees should be planted in as many public places as possible. A committee was appointed to wait upon Mayor Andrew and discuss this matter with him, and see if it would be possible to make a start this season.

A committee appointed to look over matters at the Depot, reported that they had visited the Depot and found everything in a very satisfactory condition. The waiting and toilet rooms were clean and well looked after and equipped.

Mrs. Currie and Mrs. Hazleton were appointed delegates to attend the Institute Convention at Fredericton.

The following article in reference to institute work will be of interest to our readers:

Hon. J. A. Murray is enthusiastic over the success which has been attending the work of the N. B. Women's Institutes, rapidly becoming one of the most important branches of the Department of Agriculture. Following the recent short courses in domestic science and similar work at the Dairy School, Sussex, Hon. Mr. Murray said to-day that he expected that the second annual convention of the institutes, which will be held in Fredericton, from May 26th, to 28th, to be one of the most striking gatherings of women ever held in this province. The day sessions will be held in the Y. M. C. A. building and the evening sessions will be held in the Provincial Normal School. The supervisor of the institutes, Miss Hazel Winter, of this city, is now sending out programmes for convention. Mr. J. B. Daggett, Secretary for Agriculture, will preside at the opening session next Tuesday evening, and the address of welcome will be delivered by Hon. Mr. Murray, following devotional exercises, which will be conducted by Rev. Neil McLaughlin. The reply to the address of welcome will be given on behalf of the delegates by Miss Beattie Fraser, of Grand Falls, and "How Women's Institutes Can Aid Our Public Schools," will be the subject of addresses by Mr. R. P. Stevens, Sussex, director of elementary agricultural education, and Secretary Daggett.
