WILL IT BE PEACE OR WAR

THE ISSUE HANGS ON THE RESULT OF THE GERMAN ELECTIONS.

It is a matter of course that the issue of the German elections hangs on the result of the Reichstag, that is, if a majority is not elected favoring Prince Bismarck's Septennate Bill in the Reichstag, war is certain in April. In the event of a majority favoring the Septennate Bill, the issue will be postponed, if not avoided. The prospects are that Bismarck will carry the day and have a majority of forty-three. Such are the advices from Berlin this evening.

FRANCE SOBERLY THROUGH, IN PREPARING FOR BISMARCK'S SUCCESS.
