> FOR PRACTICAL FARMERS. Hints on Many Subjects Relating to Their

The sudden change in the weather last week, from warm to cold, should admonish those who plant seeds of tender plants that there is always a risk of so doing if the planting is done before the middle of the month. A late frost only one night may destroy a month's work. If seeds have not germinated the early planting is an advantage, but it may happen that a frost will occur when least expected.

A noon rest for work-horses should not be restricted to too short a period of time. It is better to get the teams of time. It is better to get the teams out early and give them two hours rest during the middle of the day than to drive the horses too hard when the heat of the sun is oppressive.

Beets are hardy and not injured by cool weather. The tender varieties fo the table are luxuries if grown rapidly and used before they become too large and woody. The seed is sometimes slow
