BROOKE COUNCIL,

Inwood, 22nd February, 1913.

Council met pursuant to adjournment. Members all present.

Minutes of previous meeting read and on motion of Mr. Sutton, seconded by Mr. Annett, were approved.

By-law introduced to repeal a clause in by-law No. 1 of 1913, appointing James Johnston a member of the local Board of Health for the present year.

Johnston—McCabe, that by-law No. 2,

repealing the appointment of James Johnston as a member of the local Board of Health for 1913, be read and finally passed.—Carried.

Sutton—McCabe, that Dr. C. L. Taylor be appointed a member of the new local Board of Health for 1913.—Carried.

McCabe—Annett, that by-law No. 3, appointing Dr. Taylor a member of Board of Health for 1913, be finally passed.—Carried.

Duncan Campbell asked that 6-7 side-road, across the 9th and 10th concessions, be opened and fitted for travel.

McCabe—Johnston, that a committee composed of Messrs. McCabe, Sutton, Annett and Johnston, be appointed to examine and report on the condition of this road.—Carried.

A request was presented signed by Mark Burford, William Werden and R. N. McVicar, that the Burford-McVicar drain be cleaned out.

Annett—McCabe, that the Engineer be instructed to examine drain and report to Council.—Carried.

Joseph Crang complained that the Engineer had not examined the drain he had asked cleaned out, about a year ago.

McCabe—Annett, that Engineer Code be instructed to examine the 6-7 Concession Drain, in front of lots 4, 5 and 6, and if found out of repair to report with a view to enable Council to proceed with the work.—Carried.

McCabe—Annett, that the by-law to borrow the sum of \$288.00 to repair the north part of the Weidman Drain, be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried.

Petition received, signed by Richard, John and Gordon Edgar, asking that the Edgar and Coristine Awar Drain be repaired under the Drainage Act by tiling if deemed best.

McCabe—Sutton, that Engineer Code be instructed to examine this drain and, if found needing repair, to report with a view to enable Council to take the necessary steps to repair same.—Carried.

Messrs. Coristine and Parker complained about the water in ditch on south side of 12-13 Concession Road, across lots 4 to 12.

Mr. Parker also said there was only about half a mile of the Sisson-Parker Drain done yet, and urged that it be completed as soon as possible. He asked that 3-4 side-road across concessions 13 and 14 be fitted for travel.

Messrs. W. J. Lamb and D. R. Hustler asked that the Lamb Drain be repaired by making it larger, and removing the tile in it now if found necessary.

McCabe—McCabe, that the Engineer examine drain and report so as to enable Council to proceed with the desired work.—Carried.

Hugh Kennedy asked Council to aid in draining a hole on N W ¼ of lot 10, concession 3. Council agreed to inspect the locality.

Mr. Archie Monro sent in the plans and papers in connection with the 3-4 Side-road and 8-9 Concession Drain; the 7-8 Concession Blind Line Drain; the Smith-Patterson Drain, and the N pt of the Weidman Drain; and tendered his resignation as Commissioner over them.

Sutton—Johnston, that Mr. Monro's resignation be accepted for the three last mentioned drains, but as the 3-4 Side-road and 8-9 Concession Drain is nearly done, that he be requested to remain as commissioner over it and complete the work; and that Mr. McCabe be appointed commissioner over the Weidman Drain, in the place of Mr. Monro resigned.—Carried.

Annett—Sutton, that the Reeve and Treasurer be authorized to borrow the sum of \$10,000 by corporation notes, to be given from time to time as needed, and that a by-law be introduced, read and finally passed for that purpose.—Carried, read and passed.

D. J. McEachern, President Municipal Telephone System, asked permission to extend the lines on the 10-11 and 12-13 concessions into the Township of Metcalfe, also to extend the line on Townline Brooke and Warwick further west.

McCabe—Sutton, that this privilege be granted on condition that no extension be built until subscribers enough are received to make it a paying line from the start.—Carried.

Sutton—McCabe, that the sum of \$300 be appropriated to be expended in each of the five divisions of the township, by the commissioner appointed for each, for the improvement of the roads and culverts therein.—Carried.

Mr. R. B. Warner asked for a grant in aid of the Inwood Public Library.

McCabe—McCabe, that the sum of \$20

be granted in aid of the Inwood Public Library.—Carried.

By-law introduced and read to borrow by the issue of debentures the sum of \$17,000, to retire a corporation note given for telephone construction.

McCabe—Sutton, that by-law be read a first time.—Carried and read.

Annett—Johnston, that by-law be read a second time.—Carried and read.

Sutton—McCabe, that by-law be read a third time and finally passed. The clerk to give notice of the passing of the by-law and to prepare and advertise for sale the debentures required to be issued.—Carried.

Sutton—Annett, that Council do now adjourn to meet in the Village of Alvinston on Saturday, the 22nd day of March, 1913.—Carried.
