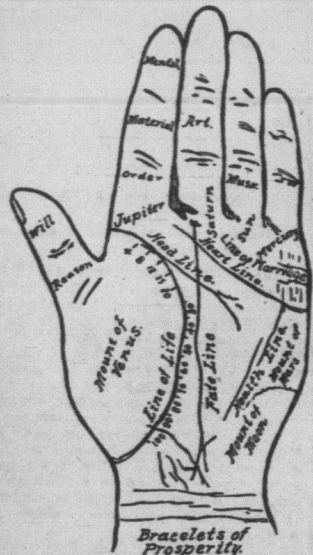

WHAT THE LIBERALS HAVE REJECTED.

The Liberal party has voted down amendment after amendment offered by the Conservative party in the interests of the public. The following is a synopsis of the improving clauses submitted by the Opposition this session, and bowed out by the party which is tied to the apron string of the Grand Trunk:

- 1-That the G. T. P. Company should pay a fair rental for any lease of the line from Winnipeg to North Bay.
- 2-That the Government should supervise the agreement between the two companies (the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific) respecting the stock issue of the G. T. P. and thus prevent any creation of watered stock.
- 3-That the Government should receive shares of the common stock of the G.T.P. in proportion to the support given by the Government to the enterprise.
- 4-That alien labor shall not be employed in the construction of the railway except when the Department of Labor decides it is necessary.
- 5-That the stock of the G. T. P. should not be placed on the market unless issued payable at par.
- 6-That in case the Grand Trunk or Grand Trunk Pacific shall divert traffic to Portland, any complaint thereon shall be investigated by the Railway Commission and reported to Parliament for action.
- 7-That the prairie section shall be completed within four years of the passing of the act.
- 8-That if the G.T.P. attempts to force upon the Government unprofitable branches, the Government secure all or any remaining branches.
- 9-That the Government should have haulage rights and running powers over the Western division for the same period granted to the company over the Eastern division.
- 10-That the Government be empowered to expropriate the railway from ocean to ocean upon paying fair compensation.
- 11-That the Government be given the powers of expropriation in the event of a diversion of freight from Canadian channels.

BY THE WAY.

The Sewer Committee realizes the difficulties of the task before it and has been studying them before beginning the work of removing them. The members desire not only to abate the nuisance which has given rise to litigation, on the part of the residents of the township, but to install a system that will handle the sewage of the town properly for the present and admit of enlargement in the future as required.

Old Man Hicks, of the political weather bureau, declares that Hon. J. M. Gibson's jaw, Ottawa was for the purpose of obtaining the appointment to the Chief Justiceship of the new Exchequer division of the High Court. It was generally believed that Mr. Gibson's receipts from the corporations with which he is connected, would not necessitate his continuing as an office-holder after the Ross Government goes down and out.

It is said of S. R. Callaway, who died in New York this week that besides being the highest salaried railway official in the world, he was the most genial and generous of men. Mr. Callaway was Canadian born, a native of Toronto. He forged his way to the front, through his own efforts and ability. He was a tremendous worker and aimed to excel in all he did. Some one has said that \$1000 men are fairly plentiful; \$5,000 few and far between, while \$10,000 men are scarce and above that figure very rare, though there are positions open for the best. Mr. Callaway's salary reached six figures.

The interest in Mr. Ganeys has not been abated in the province. Wherever he appears and relates his story, he carries conviction. There are many citizens in Berlin who would like to hear him relate his experience with the Ontario Government and its machine.

LONDON PEACE SOCIETY'S WORK.

From the London Times.

At the annual meeting of the Peace Society held in the City Temple May 17, the following resolutions by Prof. A. E. Garvie were adopted:

"That this meeting expresses its profound sorrow that a sanguinary war is being waged between two great nations in the Far East, both of them signatories to an agreement which binds them to a pacific course for the settlement of their differences; it views also with alarm and anxiety the attitude of the stronger and civilized nations toward weak and defenceless races; it deprecates the invasion of Tibet, and the slaughter of its inhabitants, under the disguise of a 'peaceful mission'; and it fervently hopes that the mediation and good offices of

some friendly power will, without delay be offered to put an end to the war, and that the British Government will withdraw its forces and seek whatever just and necessary ends it has in view by a more humane and less compromising course of action.

"That in view of the manifold efforts which are being made to promote a better understanding and a closer union between Great Britain and the United States of America, this meeting welcomes the holding of the next Universal Peace Congress in that country and urges all who are in a position to do so to take part therein."
