EMMA L. D. RUGGLES The death occurred at Gravenhurst, Ontario, of Emma L. D. Ruggles, wife of Reginald H. Ruggles, of Boston. Acting under a doctor's advice she had gone to Gravenhurst to recover from the after effects of influenza. Although at first there was improvement a heavy cold proved too much for her to overcome causing a collapse. The end came Sunday, April 18th. Her husband had been with her since Easter. Mrs. Ruggles was well and favorably known in Bridgetown, where she lived until her marriage, eight years ago. REV. JOHN CRAIG Rev. John Craig, a superannuated clergyman of the Methodist Church, died at Sandy Cove, Digby Co., on Sunday, April 18 at the age of 72, after being in precarious health for some time. OFFICE OF THE REGISTRAR, MILITARY SERVICE ACT, HALIFAX, IS CLOSED Mr. E. Hart Nichols, K. C., Returns To The Practice of Law

The Offices of Registrars under the Military Service Act throughout Canada have been closed. This ends a Chapter in Compulsory Military Service in Canada.

In September, 1917, Mr. E. Hart Nichols, K. C., on the passing of the Military Service Act, accepted the appointment of Registrar for Nova Scotia. Since early in 1919 he has had Nova Brunswick and Prince Edward Island under his charge.

Mr. Nichols is a member of the Bar of Nova Scotia, Alberta and Saskatchewan. After practicing several years at Digby Mr. Nichols moved to Calgary in 1905 where he entered practice.

Now that the work of his office as Registrar is over he will resume the practice of his profession. He has joined Mr. Alfred E. Silver, K. C., under the firm name of SILVER & NICHOLS, with office in the Metropole Building, 1011 St. Street, Halifax.

Mr. Nichols had a large and varied experience in Calgary where he resided for nine years. He enjoyed a large practice and was a director of several successful manufacturing and financial corporations of that City.

SCHOONER WRECKED AT LONG ISLAND Captain, His Wife and Crew Brought Ashore in Basket

A special telephone message to the MONITOR Sunday morning announced that the three mast schooner was ashore at Bear Cove, on the Bay Fundy shore of Long Island, three miles west of Bear's Head. The wind was north, accompanied by a thick snow storm regular February gizzard.

There was such a heavy sea running at the time that it was impossible to launch the boats. A line from the vessel was floated ashore and then a cable, to which was attached a basket, in which the captain, his wife and seven members of the crew reached the shore in safety.

The Attainment was heard from St. John's, Nfld., to be ashore to land harbor for New York. The captain had been married only two weeks and his bride's life was saved with great difficulty.

The schooner registers three hundred tons and recently completed a voyage from Cuba to Newfoundland.

The United Baptist District Meeting which convened at Clementsvale on the 26th, 27th and 28th proved an event of unusual interest in the religious life of the county. The place is beautiful for situation and the people were exceedingly kind, transporting and entertaining the delegates in splendid fashion. Ten ministers were present together with a score or more of delegates from the churches in the county. The churches failing to send delegates did themselves and the cause an injury, besides missing a real spiritual treat. The reports from the churches were only fairly encouraging. Annapolis, Nietaux and Margaretsville are rejoicing in newly settled pastors. Melvern Square, Lower Granville and Granville Mountain are still pastorless. Milford and Greywood will have the services of a student pastor this summer. Paradise and Clarence is just entering the group of pastorless churches. Pastor Carbett will be greatly missed not only by the church he has so faithfully served but by the District Meeting whose interests he has loyally supported. Most of the churches are over the top with their Forward Movement contributions. Owing to this cause however the regular offerings to the Denominational Work are not as large in many cases, as they ought to be. Special attention was called to this fact, and it was urged that pains should be taken to impress upon the people that the Forward Movement offerings were an extra.
