Annapolis Royal.—Mrs. James McKay has received word of the death of her brother, George W. James, a Austin, Texas. Mr. James was born at Annapolis Royal seventy-four years ago, and attended school here in his boyhood. He is survived by his wife and a son and daughter in Texas; his sisters, Mrs. Colley, of New York; Mrs. McKay, of Annapolis Royal; Mrs. Boehner, of Paradise, N. S.; and one brother, Horatio T. James, of Lawrenceton, Annapolis Co.

Phillip Paul.

Annapolis Royal.—The funeral of Phillip Paul, an aged Micmac "Governor," who died while visiting the reservation at Lequille, took place on Wednesday afternoon. A large number of Indians, including the Chief, Ben Pictou, followed the remains to St. Thomas's Church, and later to St. Louis Cemetery where the burial took place. Rev. D. J. Summers conducted the services at the church and grave. The deceased, who was seventy-four years of age, belonged to Cambridge, King's Co., and was one of the best known singers of the tribe.

Mrs. John Carroll.

Kentville.—Kentville lost one of its oldest and best known residents when Mrs. John Carroll died Saturday, aged 77, at her residence, Main Street, W. Mrs. Carroll was born in Paradise in 1845, a daughter of the late Phineas Bent. Over 50 years ago she married John Carroll, who for 25 years was Town Clerk of Kentville, and who predeceased her in July. For five years she has been an invalid. She was the last surviving charter member of the Kentville Baptist Church and for 50 years was a teacher in the Sunday School. One brother, William Bent, of Massachusetts, survives.

The funeral service was held at the Baptist Church Monday afternoon Dec. 10th, at 2:30 o'clock, conducted by the Pastor, Rev. D. G. Ross, assisted by Rev. G. P. Raymond. Interment in Oaks cemetery.

W. L. Troop.

The death took place on Thursday morning after an illness of some months and hastened by a paralytic stroke of Mr. W. L. Troop, highly esteemed citizen of this town.

He leaves to mourn their loss, wife (nee Miss Annie Bent, a brother, Mr. Austin Troop, residing on the old homestead at Granville Centre, four sisters, Mrs. Emma Ovington, in U. S. S. Mrs. C. Hallowell, California; Mrs. Gilbert Ray and Mrs. Chas. Hallowell in Boston; six daughters, Mrs. C. S. Day, Liverpool; Mrs. Wm. Cook, St. John; Mrs. J. S. Logan, Miss Hilda, of Niagara, Pennsylvania; Miss Lou and Miss Leta, at home, and one son, Harry, of Boston.

The late Mr. Troop was a native of Granville Centre, but moved to Bridgetown some twenty five years ago where he conducted most successfully a meat business. His genial manner and sterling integrity made him a general favorite.

After retiring from business he was with the Transcontinental during construction period, and later in Ontario. He returned home a year ago last June and has been in poor health for months back.

The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon, services being conducted by Rev. E. Underwood. Interment was in Riverside cemetery.

INSPECT APPLES, WHY NOT BANKS?

"Yesterday I missed a chance to make an important and timely protest," said Peter McArthur, the sage of Ekfrid, in the course of an article sent to the Toronto "Globe" under date of October 17th. "A Government inspector dropped in unexpectedly and caught me right in the act of packing No. 1 and Domestic Peewees. There was no time to get things in shape for him. In fact, I didn't know he was an inspector until after I had been introduced to him and had shaken hands with him. Still, it didn't matter for he examined my pack carefully and passed it as being up to standard, or a little above it. My first feeling was one of relief, for I had been worrying a little, as I had not packed apples for the market for some time. It was not until after he had gone that I remembered the attitude of Big Business toward Government inspection. 'You cannot make men honest by law.' 'We must not have interference with private business.' If that sort of talk applies to Big Business, why not to little business? Why should the Government come nosing into my apple barrels if it must not be allowed to look into the operations of banks? Surely it is as necessary to look after the safety of the bank deposits of the plain people as to see that they are not sold under-stood apples that are wormy or off color. Inspection is every bit as justifiable in one case as in the other. Recent bank disclosures show that they sometimes pack rotten securities in their vaults. Why should that be allowed any more than packing rotten apples in barrels? Even-handed justice demands that banking be inspected just as carefully as apple-packing."
