NEW YORK AND ERIE I. MILWAY

"The rallways here, that is in England, are not better than our own. Either the English roads have deteriorated, erelse our own have appreciated I assume that the fastest train on the direct ince between Liverpool and London may be taken as a fair sample, and compared with slimitar trains on the New York and Erie Railwoy at home-with which I am most familia. From Inverpool to London, two hunred and twenty miles, through first class fare is thirty-live shillings—say nine dollars. On the New York and Erie, from New York to the west end of Suspension Bridge, in Canada, distance upwards of four hundred and fifty miles, in drawing room c.ach, the lare is nine dollars and twenty-two cents. We ride in by far the most elegant coaches on the Erie than here in England, and at only one half the cest. We ride as fast, too, on the Erie as in England, about thirty-nine miles in either case. In smoothness there is no comparison. Motion on the New York and Erie is like tin palls in a wheelbarrow. Here there are four wheels inder a coach, on the New York and Erie twelve! Here one wheel failing necessitates disaster; on the Erie we can spin of from one to six, and, if judiclously selected, the coach is still mobile and not a wreek. Here it is difficult to talk, and impossible to write, on the Erie I do both intelligibly. I am proudly surprised, atter an absonce of some years, we find an English nailway no longer superior to others in the world in any particular that offects a traveller—no, not even in the nexter of dust and ashes."
