BRIEFLETS.

Rev. Father Perrault, O. M. I., came down with Mgr. Legal and put up in St. Boniface Hospital.

Recent advices from Ottawa inform us that on Oct. 18, Mgr. Falconio, the Delegate Apostolic, took up his temporary residence at the University.

We are glad to state that the Very Rev. Vicar General is now back at the Archbishop's House, though his sprain still prevents him from saying Mass.

His Lordship Bishop Legal, O. M. I., arrived last Thursday at archiepiscopal residence on his way to the celebration in Ottawa of Archbishop Duhamel's 25th year of episcopal consecration.

The Atlin Globe of Sept. 28, just received, announces that Mr. A. Moorhouse found on his claim the biggest nugget of pure gold yet discovered in the Atlin camp. The lump weighs 3 lbs. 2 oz., is flat in form and is valued at \$600.

The Rev. A. Rousseau, ordained priest last Sunday, has been named assistant to the Rev. Father Cherrier at the Immaculate Conception, Winnipeg. The Rev. W. Lalonde, who received priestly orders on the same day, is appointed assistant to Mgr. Ritchot at St. Norbert.

His Grace the Archbishop of St. Boniface and His Lordship Bishop Legal, accompanied by Rev. Fathers Beaudin, O. M. I., and Perrault, O. M. I., took the train for the east the day before yesterday en route for the episcopal jubilee of His Grace the Archbishop of Ottawa which takes place to-morrow.

Last Saturday, Oct. 21, the thermometer marked 64° in the shade and 92° in the sun; pretty good for this northern clime. Most people are inclined to forget, what the Statistical Year-book tells us, that the average mean summer temperature of Manitoba, 60.1, is higher than in Quebec and New Brunswick.

Judge and Mrs. Prud'homme, of St. Boniface, mourn the loss of their youngest child, Paul Adolphe Joseph, who died on the 19th instant, aged two months. The funeral took place Saturday, 21st inst., at 4 p. m., from the family residence, corner St. Joseph and Notre Dame streets, to the cathedral. Laudate pueri Dominum!

On Nov. 25 of this year the Rev. Father William Lambert, of Mason City, will have been a priest 50 years. He will be the first member of the West Virginia clergy who will have the honor of spending 50 years in priesthood. He is a brother of Father Lambert, the editor of the Freeman's Journal and author of "Notes on Ingersoll." His father was a Wexford Irishman, who fought at Oulart Hill. He migrated to Western Penn-

sylvania and married a Quakeress, Lydia Jones, who became a Catholic.

The Very Rev. Father Duhaut, V. G. of Saskatchewan, came down from Prince Albert last week en route for the east, and stopped here a couple of days, taking the Atlantic express last Thursday.

Rev. Father Passaplan, from Fribourg, Switzerland, was a guest of the Jesuit Fathers at St. Boniface College and went yesterday to Notre Dame de Lourdes. He intends founding a colony of his countrymen in Manitoba.

Dr. J. A. Devine, of the 90th Batt., hoped to accompany the Canadian contingent for South Africa on the medical staff, and to leave to-day with the Winnipeg men; but yesterday a telegram came saying that the list of military surgeons is complete. His departure would create quite a void in medical, literary, dramatic and social circles in Winnipeg. We wish him any amount of professional "kudos," but we Catholics, who have so few doctors of our own faith, cannot spare the skill and geniality of Dr. Devine.

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ORDINATION AT THE CATHEDRAL.

Last Sunday at 10 o'clock the cathedral of St. Boniface was so completely filled in all its galleries and corners as to impress on the overcrowded worshippers the urgent need of a larger edifice. The occasion was the conferring of the order of priesthood by His Grace Archbishop Langevin, O. M. I., on Rev. J. A. Rousseau and Rev. Wilfrid Lalonde. The former is a B. A. of Manitoba University, the latter a cleric formerly of the diocese of Montreal. His Grace was assisted by Rev. Father Blain, S. J., who acted as archdeacon, and by Rev. Father Messier. Rev. Father Gravel was master of ceremonies and notary. Besides the priests already mentioned the following took part in the solemn laying on of hands: Very Rev. A. Dugas, V. G., Rev. Father Dorais, O. M. I., Rev. L. Drummond, S. J., Rev. J. Trudel, D. D., Rev. Father Lemieux, Rev. C. Passaplan, Father Drummond assisted Father Rousseau, and Father Trudel assisted Father Lalonde in the reading of the Mass with the Archbishop.

His Grace preached after the Gospel. He began by thanking the ladies who had worked so hard and unselfishly for the success of the bazaar. He congratulated them on their success, reminded them that this great work of building a cathedral was not intended for him—he was only the present occupant of the see, he would soon pass away—but for the glory of God. Then the Archbishop went on to speak of the duties of a priest. In the first place he must be holy, that is, detached from all sensual and worldly tastes. The priest who feathers his nest and surrounds himself with creature comforts is not worthy of his high calling; he will be set aside and replaced by one who knows how to deny himself, to suffer. Blessed is the priest that carries his cross. Secondly, he must be learned. Young men preparing for the priesthood must not neglect any useful studies, they must not, for instance, neglect the natural sciences on the plea that they are not necessary for theology, that a man who is destined for a country mission does not need them. This is a mistake. Precisely because you are on a country mission, far from any learned priest whom you could consult, you should be learned yourself. Holiness and knowledge are the two eyes of the priest.

For Small Boys.

The Sisters of Charity of St. Boniface, yielding to repeated requests from various quarters, have determined to undertake the management of a boarding-house for boys between the ages of six and twelve. Special halls will be set apart for them, where, under the care and supervision of the Grey Nuns, they will be prepared for their First Communion, while attending either the Preparatory Department of St. Boniface College or the classes of Provencher Academy. This establishment will be known as "Le Jardin de l'Enfance" (Kindergarten). The results already attained in similar institutions of the Order give every reason to hope that this arrangement will fill a long felt want. Board and lodging will cost six dollars a month. For the boys who attend Provencher Academy there will be an additional charge of fifty cents a month; and for those who take music lessons, \$3 a month. Bedding, mending and washing will be extra. The Sisters are willing to attend to these extras on terms to be arranged with them. The boys who attend the Preparatory Department of St. Boniface College will have to pay the tuition fees of the College.
