

## NOTICES OF MOTIONS.

Mr. *Gigault*—When the Bill (No 94) intituled: “An Act to explain and further to amend ‘the Canada Temperance Act, 1878,’ and the Act of 1879 amending the same” (from the Senate) is referred to a Committee of the Whole House—That the Eleventh Section be struck out and the following substituted therefor:—

“11. The dealing in Ales, Porter, Lager Beer, Cider and light Wines under ten per cent of Alcohol in premises in which no other intoxicating liquor is kept or stored, shall be exempt from the operation of “The Canada Temperance Act, 1878”; and for the purpose of ascertaining whether any such Ale, Porter, Lager Beer, Cider or light Wine contains more than ten per cent of Alcohol samples thereof may be obtained and submitted for analysis in like manner as is provided in respect of adulterated articles of food by the “Inland Revenue Act, 1875”; and for the purpose of ascertaining whether any intoxicating liquor containing a larger percentage of Alcohol than that herein specified is kept or stored in the premises in which the dealing aforesaid is carried on, any officer or person employed in the service of the Department of Inland Revenue may enter into and upon such premises at any reasonable hour and search for any such liquor, and may, for the purpose of submitting the same for analysis, obtain samples thereof as hereinbefore provided. Provided also that the sale of Ales, Porter, Lager Beer, Cider and light Wines under ten per cent of Alcohol shall be lawful only by such vendors as may be specially licensed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council, in each Province, the number not to exceed one in each Township or Parish, or two in each Town or incorporated Village; and in Cities not to exceed one for every four thousand inhabitants.”
