But generally His Excellency's Secretary addresses a letter to the Speaker of each House, informing him of the day and hour appointed. After taking his seat the Speaker says: "Honourable Senators, I have "received a communication from the Secre-"tary of His Excellency the Governor Gen-"eral in the following words:"-He reads the letter; and it is laid on the Table.
