**100.** Occasionally, when the business of the Session is drawing to a close, the Leader, in answer to a Senator or of his own accord, informs the Senate that His Excellency will prorogue Parliament to-morrow, or the day after, if the business before the Senate will allow. But generally His Excellency's Secretary addresses a letter to the Speaker of each House, informing him of the day and hour appointed. After taking his seat the Speaker says: “Honourable Senators, I have received a communication from the Secretary of His Excellency the Governor General in the following words:”—He reads the letter; and it is laid on the Table.
