

At the seventy-eighth extraordinary general meeting of the Bank of British North America, held on March 3rd at their offices at 5 Gracechurch street. London, England, the directors recom-mended the payment of a further dividend of 40s. a share, equal to a yearly dividend of 8 per cent. The profits of the corporation for the year, including \$93,446.79, which

had been brought forward from the last balance sheet, amounted to \$783,-191.89, of which \$194,666.66 was appropriated to the dividend paid in Ocber last, leaving a balance of \$588,-525.23. The dividend which the directors

now propose to pay amounts to \$194,-666.66; \$97,323.33 has been transferred to the reserve fund and a like amount was transferred to the bank premises The directors also recommend a

bonus to the staff of 5 per cent., which amounts to \$36.500, leaving a balance of \$108,437.58 to be carried forward. The sum of \$7,440.72 has been set aside for the officers' widows, and or-phans' fund, \$44.866.95 for the pension fund, and \$1,946.66 to the officers' life insurance fund.


