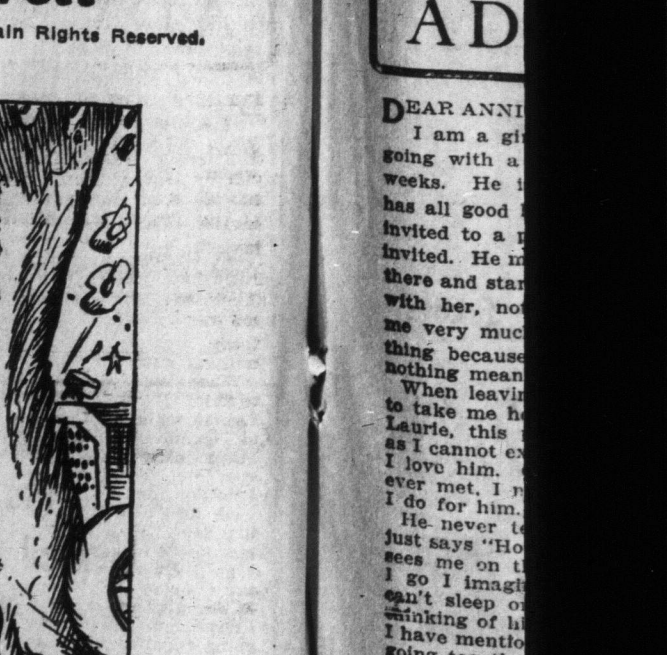
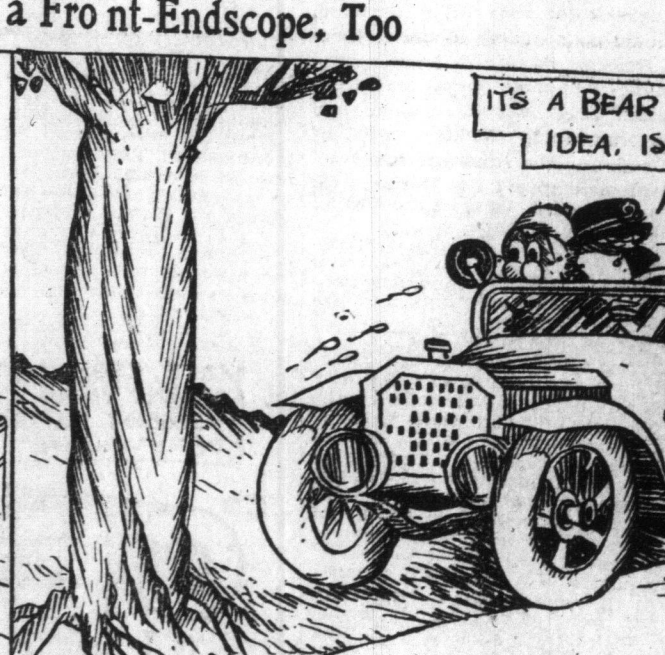
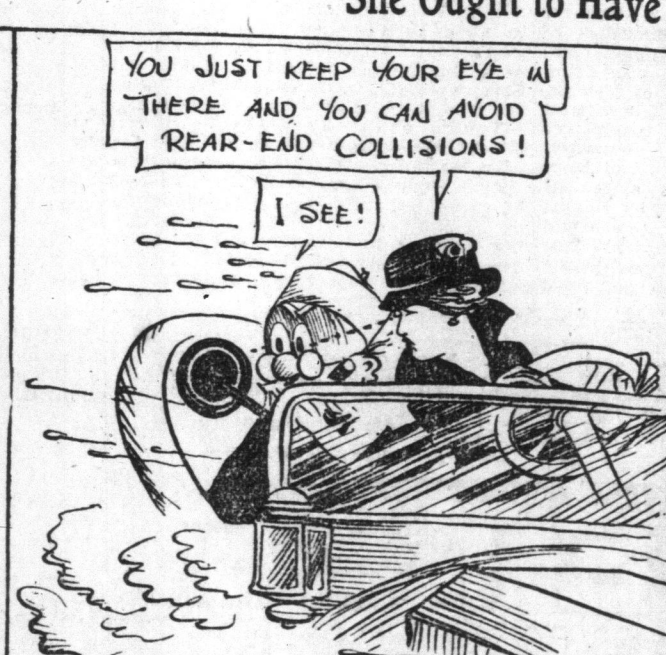

### HAROLD HARGREAVE SECURES DAMAGES

International Railway Co. to Pay Four Hundred Dollars for Injury in Wreck.

A settlement whereby Harold Hargreave, 17, received \$400 and costs was ratified by Mr. Justice Ebertson at Osgoode Hall on Tuesday morning. Hargreave sustained a gashed forehead and numerous bruises in the International Railway wreck at Queenston in July last.

Duncan Ontario Bell, of Brampton, is the defendant in an action brought by Robert Newton Holmes of Netherleigh, Lancashire, to recover the sum of \$41,708.80, alleged due under an agreement. The plaintiff claims a first mortgage as security on property in the County of Peel.

A writ has been issued by Bouter, McMillan & Co. against Christopher Robinson of Kingston, and T. J. Robinson of Toronto to recover \$6725.56, alleged due on a promissory note.
