

Wheat Prices Still Going Down Heavy Piling Up of Stocks

Extreme Weakness in Northwest Markets Depresses Sentiment at Chicago—Big Slump in Corn.

CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—(Can. Press).—Action taken by the leading owners of cash wheat here in using newspaper advertising space as a method of finding customers for his property led today to pronounced selling pressure, with the close showing a loss of 1-16 to 1-32 net. All other staples suffered in sympathy from this decline, oats to 1-16 to 1-32 and hogs at a decline of 1-16 to 1-32.

Throughout the day the wheat market seemed almost on the verge of demoralization. Traders in general who were on the bull side were not only disheartened, but also much puzzled at the unprecedented course of advertising millions of bushels of grain for sale. The fact that the advertisement occupied only a couple of inches of space at the bottom of a column added to the mystification. Exchanges elsewhere, especially northwest and southwest, were equally weak.

Corn Very Weak.
Corn sold at the lowest price in months. Besides the weakness that spread from the wheat market, there was depression on account of impending large receipts and because no corresponding call had come from the eastern consumer. In fact, there was a great deal of unloading on the part of the locals.

Canadian Visible.

Liverpool Wheat Market.
LIVERPOOL, Dec. 5.—The market at the opening was influenced by the less favorable reports from Argentina and firmness in Buenos Ayres, and prices were unchanged, these affecting the local market. Following the opening there was an advance on the expectation of a large decrease in the visible stock and a slight decline occurred, with local trading on a moderate scale. Argentine of favorable weather, and larger arrivals of new wheat at the port. There is a small inquiry here for both cargoes and parcels.

CHICAGO GOSSIP

Sluggish Cash Demand and Big Stocks Depress Wheat Market.

J. P. Bickell received the following from Logan & Bryan: "Wheat—It looks as if the most courageous bulls in the trade outside of the big cash wheat owners, who are having their own troubles and heavy load to carry, lost heart to-day more than at any time previous, in looking at the enormous domestic wheat supplies. The lake navigation season has closed, leaving the United States visible supply at seventy million bushels at Chicago total wheat stocks about 17,000,000 bushels, and Minneapolis has accumulated 15,000,000 bushels, and the daily reports from there indicate a sluggish cash wheat demand and a disappointing four trade. These things, combined with the continued heavy run to winter wheat markets, and the fact that the Canadian wheat is selling for export quite freely, while there is practically no foreign inquiry for the big stocks in this country, all count heavily against holders—and force the general selling."
