#### WINNIPEG LEADS

Ahead of Both Minneapolis and Chicago in Grain Shipments.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 5.—Statistics of Winnipeg grain shipments are prepared on the basis of the Canadian crop year, September 1 to August 31, while similar statistics in the United States are based on the calendar year. To afford a direct comparison with principal United States shipping points, Secretary Bell of the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, has prepared calendar figures for 1911 as follows:

Wheat, Winnipeg, 1,012,350 bushels; Minneapolis, 95,647,850 bushels; Chicago, 42,829,750 bushels.

Oats—Winnipeg, 26,138,800 bushels; Minneapolis, 11,400,820 bushels.

#### CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION

May Commence With Enquiry Into Department of Public Works.

OTTAWA, Jan. 5.—(Special).—The civil service inquiry commission is settling down into its offices and will be busy for some time with the work of organization.

It is unlikely that the commission will appoint a general counsel. Instead, it will act as its own counsel and will save the expense. The next few days will be devoted to preliminary work and the formal investigation will not begin until next week. While nothing has been decided, it may commence with the department of public works.

The commission ultimately may be expected to go west and investigate on the ground the work of the department of the interior.

### WHAT'S DOING ALL OVER THE COUNTY OF YORK

North and West Toronto Jottings  
—Suburban Happenings—East York Conservatives to Meet.

NORTH TORONTO, Jan. 5.—(Special).—In view of the inaugural meeting of the town council on Monday night, it has been thought advisable to postpone the monthly rally of the North Toronto Conservative Association until a later date, of which due notice will be given.

There has been considerable delay in the installation of the drop letter boxes throughout the town, but the postoffice department are now taking it up in earnest, and this much needed reform will soon be a reality.

Yonge-st. is a busy thoroughfare these days, with all the local and thru traffic and which is more particularly noticeable at the C. P. R. crossing, especially during the passage of a long freight train. Dear Park people are wondering when the grade of the highway from the bottom of the Gallows Hill will be lowered to conform to the sidewalks.

The Ratepayers' Association have called off their regular meeting for Saturday night, as no pressing matters are now up for discussion, the Lemonville water question having been handed over to the town council to officially deal with.

Real estate is moving, but not very swiftly these days, and a resumption of good roads, a trifle warmer weather and the final settlement of some of the big municipal questions will make things hum. Up along Yonge-st. and beyond the York Mills hill, where large blocks have been acquired for building purposes, property sales in small lots are said to be quite active.


