### WHO'LL BE WARDEN AND CLERK IN YORK COUNTY

Nobody So Far Can Pick Out the Winner—N. Toronto Committee Meet.

Around the county council offices on city, speculation is rife as to the selection of the warden for next year, and the selection of county clerk, succeeding Adelaide-street, where the township fathers are wont to gather when in the late Mr. Ramsden, gives room for many diverse views.

The deadlock existing in December, when Mr. Keith of Newmarket and Mr. Phillips of King were applicants for the position, is, in spite of all rumors to the contrary, not to again occur at next week's session. The number of members is practically the same, and the Newmarket was given another representative, this is offset in a measure by the absence of Stouffville, and Reeve McMurtry of King Township, who is at Hot Springs in Arkansas, incapacitated thru rheumatism, and will not be present.

There are a number of changes, though, in the personnel of the council, and these will undoubtedly be marked enough to effect the selection of one or other of the two aspirants. The wardenship is more difficult of analysis, three or four men being in the field, any one of whom might land the coveted prize. John Gardhouse of Bloufords, Reeve Coulson of Stouffville, and Reeve McMurtry of King are undoubtedly candidates for the high office, while Reeve W. D. Annie of Scarborough, tho at one time aspiring to the office, is said to have temporarily at least retired from the contest. This leaves two rural candidates in the field in Meers, Gardhouse and McMurtry, as against one village man, R. P. Coulson. Whether the result will be to range up the township against the township, to decide the matter along political lines, or on the lines of merit and length of service, does not yet appear, but time will tell and next Tuesday will likely settle the matter for good.
