U. S. Expert Advises Canada to Retain Ownership of Its Woodland Wealth.

"While we have made great progress said Mr. Pinchot, "in our forestry of partment, we are not in a position be all success. ness proposition. Not because we denot love the forests, but we claim the fundamental thing is the use of the forest. Therefore, forestry is a business matter and should be treated in a business-like way.

A Nation's Duty.

"Having in mind production in the first place, it was the duty of a nation to protect, its forests. If we are to realize any permanent protection we must rest on the conviction of all the people and secure for the work a practically unanimous and effective public sentiment. Then again in the United States the great bulk of forests are under private ownership. In Canada this is not the case, and forest preservation should be an object easy to accomplish.

"Our department has to show the owners of forests that it was worth while to look after their timber. We
