JOINT HIGH COMMISSION. New York Post Urges That It Be

New York, June 22. - The Evening Post urges immediate re-assembling of the Point High Commission, and says: "In the present temper of the Canadian ministry, it would be easy for the Joint High Commission to agree upon a basis for a reciprocity treaty. At a later time we may have to deal with protectionists more vicient than

our own.

"It is highly important, then, that the Joint High Commission should meet, for Canada and the Unitad States have every reason for adjusting their trade relations before the Canadian tariff policy is hopelessly warped by Imperial Canada. Obviously, Canada's emergency is critical, for she may be asked to enter the general tariff war and expose her whole system of government finance to the hazard of a long and almost hopeless process of equalization.

"If there is a glimmer of larger po-tical size at Washington, the Joint High Commission will be promptly convened, and directed to draw up plans for reciprocal lowering of duties."
