The Trackmen's Strike.

The Grand Trunk trackmen should be able to return to work today in a comfortable frame of mind. They have secured a recognition of their as-sociation, and within thirty days the wages question will be adjusted, practically by arbitration, with a rea-sonable assurance that the men will be granted an increase of pay. Manager Hays has given proof of his goodwill by allowing the trackmen's committee free transportation over the Grand Trunk system in the meantime, so that they may confer with the trackmen all along the line and ascertain their vari-ous grievances.

This is a victory for conciliation and consultation. The management of the company wisely concede the principle that labor is free to combine, and has a right to collective action. The com-pany have also admitted the force of public opinion as a factor in their re-lations with their employees. It is an-other illustration that the unfeeling law of mere supply and demand is being overruled in these days by moral and social considerations. The Grand Trunk Company will gain by thus acknowledging the associative rights of the trackmen, because the latter will feel a new dignity and increased responsibility as a recognized union, and will have a fresh incentive to prove that they are worthy of the confidence reposed in them by their employers.

A word of credit is due to those who were instrumental in bringing the com-pany and the employees together, and in furthering the negotiations. Mr. James Sutherland, M. P., who acted for Sir Wilfrid Laurier, appears to have carried out the Premier's instructions with tact and skill. The Opposition members who previously interceded for the trackmen deserve gratitude for their sympathy and good intentions; but the weight of the Premier's posi-tion, combined with his "sunny ways," and other personal qualities, doubtless made him naturally a more effective mediator.

The strikers have earned public com-mendation by their behavior, and we feel sure will reward public support by faithful performance of duty.

The Point of View.

The point on the Street Railway Company's side likeliest to have weight with the public is the assertion that the employees, if recognized in their col-lective capacity, would want to run the road, would render discipline and over-sight difficult, and would put obstacles in the way of the deserved dismissal of drunken or dishonest men.
One answer to this is that the C. P. R. and G. T. R. Companies, like the Hamilton Street Railway Company, do deal with the men in their collective capacity, and none of these companies have difficulty in dismissing men who are dishonest or drunken.
There is also another way of looking at it. Instead of accepting the men in their collective capacity with a grudge, let the arbitrators, after laying down fair conditions for both sides, throw the men frankly on their honor, in the court of public opinion, as to their treatment of the Company.
President Mahone, a few evenings ago, talking to the Hamilton men's union, after a fair settlement with the Hamil-

Why Not in London?

If the G. T. R. Company can meet the trackmen in friendly conference, and, through the good offices of dis-in-terested arbitrators, come to a prac-tically satisfactory settlement, as has now been done, why should the London Street Railway decline to do likewise?

Concerning Payment of the Piper.

The Company's circular to the public uses this phrase: "The one who pays the piper should set the tune." Yes; but it is usually all the better to pay and treat the piper fairly, and in return you will be apt to get a better tune. The Company say, in effect, they have a right to "do what they like with their own," in their relations with employees. They have no such right, except as it goes along with a fair living wage, and with reasonable mutual protection on the part of the men, to the end that they are not discriminated against be-cause they believe that labor to be re-spected needs some bond of organiza-tion. Nobody has any moral claim to do what he likes with what he calls his own, except in so far as he does what is right.

We do not deny that the Street Rail-way Company's directors are keen men. But consideration often pays better than undue keenness.

Holding the Balances Even.

The tone of occupants of the judicial bench varies, depending sometimes on heredity, sometimes on environment. The recent utterances of Judge Barron, of Stratford, on the trackmen's strike, seem to us to hold the balances even. He told the men they had a perfect right to organize for the purpose of bettering their condition, but that they should not in any way whatever counten-ance disorder or breaches of the peace. At the same time, he remarked, he felt free to say that, in his opinion, 98 cents per day was not an adequate sum upon which to expect a man to support a wife and family, and he hoped the Company might be able, in con-fERENCE with the men, to adjust the difficulty in some way that would be mutually fair. Happily, Judge Barron's words have proved prophetic.

Lord Roberts to Take Command of the British Army.

Reported Massacre of Three Mis-sionaries in China Denied.

President Kruger Indorsed by the Boers—Major Marchand at Home Again—Remains of Spanish Armada Found at Dunkirk.

London, June 19.—Lord Wolseley, who has been alling, will retire as commander-in-chief of the army next month. His successor will be Lord Roberts, who will be replaced at Dub-lin by the Duke of Connaught.

OOM PAUL INDORSED.
A meeting of 4,000 burgers at Parde Kraal indorsed President Kruger's atti-tude regarding the franchise, and deprecated war. There were no dis-turbances.

MAJOR MARCHAND.
Major Marchand arrived yesterday morning at Thoissey, his birthplace, and was received by the mayor and enthusiastic crowds.

HICKORY WANTED.
Among recent trade inquiries at the high commissioner's office was one for any firm in Canada who would undertake to procure and export im-mediately hickory, to be used as golf sticks; length, 44 inches, by 7/8 square.

MORE CABLE TALK.
The Imperial Government, having in-timated its willingness to consider whether more assistance might be given to the peace conference, it is now being arranged between the repre-sentatives of the colonists and the Im-perial Government will result in a sat-isfactory settlement of the question.

THE MISSIONARIES SAFE.
Hong Kong, June 19.—The report that Rev. S. H. Phillips, Mrs. Phillips and their three children, who were in the Province of Ngan Hwei, is contradicted, and it is no longer announced that all are safe.

INTERESTING RELICS.
Excavations which are being made at Dunkirk in connection with the exten-sion of the docks have revealed a wooden warship with antique cannon buried in the sand. It is believed that the vessel belonged to the Spanish Armada, which was fitted out in 1587 for the subjugation of England.

TEN DROWNED.
Bremen, June 19.—In a collision off Friedrichshaven between the German steamer Arthurschaff and the British steamer Mauritius, the former was sunk and ten of her crew drowned.

Rosario, June 19.—The British steamer Castilian, Prince (Captain Coull), from London, and Amphitrite (Capt. Maloney), from Sunderland and Buenos Ayres, have been in collision. The Castilian Prince arrived here in a badly damaged condition. The damage to the Amphitrite is unknown.

MAY ABDICATE.
London, June 19.—The Berlin corre-spondent of the Daily Mail says: In the course of a secret session of the Diet of Sax-Coburg and Gotha yester-day (Saturday), the minister of state, Count von C. P. von Streng, made a confidential communication con-taining the sensational announce-ment that Duke Alfred of Sax-Coburg and Gotha, the reigning duke, would probably abdicate this year.

CARLIST GUNS SEIZED.
Madrid, June 19.—Official confirma-tion has been received here of the seizure of the yacht Firefly at Arachon, a popular summer bathing place, 35 miles by rail southwest of Bordeaux, France, with 4,000 rifles, said to have been for the Carlists. It is claimed the vessel belongs to Lord Ashburton, who is looked upon as being the rep-resentative of Don Carlos, the Span-ish pretender, in England. A well-known Carlist, who has been inter-viewed on the subject, said: "Even if 4,000 rifles have been seized, 8,000 have

He said: "I was very glad to be at Manila and the visit increased my respect for the American character. After all, blood is thicker than water; but I must not go on, for a friend of mine, Capt. Coghlan, got into trouble through talk-ing the other day." (Laughter and cheers.)

From this stage of the proceedings Mark Twain and Capt. Chichester shared the honors of the evening, everybody desiring to shake hands with both.

SET FREE TO DIE.
London, June 19.—Joe Mullatt, the Irish political prisoner, sentenced to imprisonment for life for attempting to murder a juror who convicted Michael Walsh, was liberated from prison Friday evening. He is in a dying condition.

CANADIANS ARE LOYAL.
London, June 19.—The Earl of Aber-deen, in an address before the Eighty Club in London, said that Canada was thoroughly and unques-tionably loyal to the British crown.

"Anything like serious contem-plation of annexation to the United States," said his lordship, "is absolutely a thing of the past; and the French-Canadians are among the firmest sup-porters of a direct British connection."

Lord Aberdeen said he anticipated a satisfactory and pacific solution of the Alaska boundary dispute.

ANGLO-GERMAN TREATY.
Berlin, June 19.—The Anglo-German treaty bill was read in the Reichstag Saturday for the first time, after a long speech by Count Posadowsky, im-perial secretary of state for the in-terior, in the course of which he ex-plaind that only the British colonies which had not differentiated in favor of the movement would receive the most favored nation privileges granted by the bill to England.

CABLE NOTES.
Senator Pierre Waldeck-Rousseau, it is understood, has accepted the task of forming a cabinet conditional upon the co-operation of M. Casimir-Perrier and certain sections of the French Chamber of Deputies.

As the outcome of quarrels over the Dreyfus affair, two duels were fought at Brest, France, Friday, between two officers, naval and artillery, and pro-fessors at the public schools. One of each professions was wounded.

The British House of Lords has fin-ally dismissed the appeal of the own-ers of the steamer La Bourgogne from the decision holding the steamer re-sponsible for the collision with the ship Cromartyshire, which resulted in the sinking of La Bourgogne, with great loss of life.

The Sultan of Turkey is decidedly op-posed to the arbitration, schemes of the peace conference at The Hague, and several indignant councils of min-isters have been held on the subject at the Yildiz palace.

MARK TWAIN
Banqueted by the White Friars Club—Pleasant Words All Around.

London, June 19.—Mark Twain was tendered a dinner by the high-toned White Friars Club in London, at which Dean Hole, Chauncey M. Depew, Sir Edward Chichester, who commanded the British fleet at Manila when Ad-miral Dewey did some things to Ad-miral Von Dietrichs, Max O'Hell, Mrs. Frank Leslie, Beatrice Harraden, and over 200 other celebrities were present.

Mr. Louis Frederic Austin, in pro-posing Mark Twain's health, said: "What most appeals to men and wo-men in his own calling, and what will ever cause his name to be associated with Sir Walter Scott's in similar cir-cumstances is his noble courage in his hearty indorsement, which received struck a serious note, and he told us what we all in our hearts already knew—that the European powers, save England, sympathized with our ene-mies, and that it was only their knowl-

In a Healthy Condition

Bradstreet's Weekly Review of Trade in Canada.
Toronto, June 19.—Bradstreet's weekly review of Canadian wholesale trade says: Business at Montreal the past week was fair for this time of the year, while dullness prevailed about the middle of June, there is now a very fair sorting trade being done, and business generally is in a very healthful condition. The job-bing trade at the coast is being sent to the north, and a recent steamer took a cargo valued at \$200,000. The Klondike business is much more active now than it has been for a long time. The crops, which have been backward, are doing better now.

Trade at Toronto has been quite active during the week. Retail business through the province has been better since the first of the month, and a big sorting business is being done by the wholesalers at Toronto. Business prospects for the fall trade are very promising. The money market is steady, but there does not appear to be much money available for specu-lation and this has affected the prices of mining, and, to some extent, the standard stocks during the week.

There has been a good business done at Winnipeg the past week. The de-mand for general staple goods from Manitoba points is active. The addition to the population have al-ready made a difference in the move-ment in wholesale departments of trade.

BRITISH MILLIONS INVESTED IN ONTARIO.
Chicago, June 19.—A special from Du-luth says: "In the last few days there has been closed three deals with British capitalists, amounting to \$8,000,000, on the Rainy Lake district of West-ern Ontario, and large transactions are now pending for the sale of other mines in the region to England."

PROMINENT MASON DEAD.
New York, June 19.—The death is announced of Simeon Fry, sovereign grand commander of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite for the United States. He succumbed to an operation for appendicitis at a hospital in this city. He was 46 years old.
