Probability That Marchand Will To the Joint Note of the Be Recalled.

When Found by Kitchener.

Paris Presents the Appearance of a Camp-Strikers Said To Be Losing Their Enthusiasm-An Echo of the Dreyfus Discussion.

Paris, Oct. 12 .- The French Government, it is reported, has been informed that its dispatch to Major Marchand, forwarded by the courtesy of the Brittish Government through the sirdar, has already been delivered, and that Major Marchand is sending an officer with his reply to Cairo, whence it will be telegraphed to Paris, probably arpapers are making strong efforts to excite public opinion against Great Britain, but it is believed in the best informed circles that Major Marchand will be authorized to return by way

of Cairo. The London correspondent of the Matin admits that the evidence supports the truth of the reports as to the deperate condition in which Gen. Kitchener fornd Major Marchand, and as to the latter's almost utter lack of supplies of any kind. He says: "It is probable that Major Marchand confessed his inability to retain the position, even if not handicapped by the presence of the British and the dervishes. It is, however, out of the question that Marchand should accept the British offer, courteous though it may be, to provide him transportation to Cairo. If he admits the impracticability of remaining at Fashoda, he ought to fall back to his former post at Bahr-El-Ghazel. such an event France could negotiate with Great Britain to enable her to revictual and reinforce Major Marchand by the only possible route, namely, the Nile. Whatever may be the developments of the situation, however, France must not abandon her rights to have an outlet by the Nile for the commerce of her Central

African possessions. PARIS LIKE A CAMP. A New York Herald Paris dispatch says: Paris is slowly taking on the appearance of a huge camp. Troops are to be seen everywhere. Detachments of infantry or cavalry are on guard at every spot where a building is being constructed or dea sentry, and miniature camps, formed of half a dozen men, with stacked rifles, adds a picture gave touch of a large lar rifles, adds a picturesque touch of color

to the streets. The strikers hail the troops with cries of "Vive l'Armee!" At some places where work is still going on, recalcitrant workmen hobnob, chat, loke and argue politics with the soldiers who are there to see that they do not molest the non-strikers. Parisians in general seem to look upon the troops as forming part of a spectacle specially arranged for their ben-

It is believed that if a crowd of strikers were to bare their breasts to receive the rifle balls, the soldiers, backed by the tacit approval of their officers, might turn up their weapons, and, if they fired at all, would fire in

CARPENTERS KEEP OUT.

The carpenters met late last evening and decided not to join the strike. The strike meeting yesterday, although they adopted resolutions in favor of continuing the strike, displayed a fast waning enthusiasm, and the leaders fear that the movement will collapse. FORTY THOUSAND MEN OUT.

There are at this moment on strike some 40,000 men. Where persuasion has failed to in-

duce hesitation workmen to join the strikers, a mild sort of violence has been tried. Some stone-cutters working upon some sculpture on the Champs Elysees Hotel were disagreeably surprised to find a group of strikers calmly sawing through the tall poles supporting the scaffolding on which they were working. They has-tened down to solid earth as quickly as possible, where they were informed they must join the strikers. CHARACTERISTIC CARTOON.

Caron Aranche's cartoon in the Figaro has sinister weight. It repre-

sents the blind republic turning into the 28th year of her existence. Awaiting her in the road are a Medusaheaded hag holding brief bags of the Dreyfus affair, a sturdy workman standing idle with folded hands, Britannia with a trident and shield bear-ing the motto "Fashoda," the Duc d'Orleans and the Prince Louis Napoleon, both ready to enter into posession of France; a scowling Arab and a long perspective of other enemies. And right into their midst is walking the blind Phrygian-bonneted figure.

THE DREYFUS CASE.

M. Clemenceau, in answer to an article in the Aurore, asserts that letters purporting to have been written by the German emperor figure Dreyfus Dossier, not indeed as originals, but as photographs. These, he declares, were palmed off as authentic upon Mr. Hanotaux, the former minister of foreign affairs, who paid 27,-000 francs for them. Mr. Clemenceau challenges contradictions on these statements.

Powers.

Desperate Condition of the Major | No Modification of the Ultimatum-The Exodus From Orete-Electric Lightning Scheme.

> London, Oct. 12.-The Constantinople correspondent of the Times says: The sultan's reply to the note of the powers says he will withold three fortified places in Crete with garrisons sufficient to protect the Mohammedans and to defend the Ottoman flag. Measures have been taken to begin the withdrawal of the Turkish troops from

the island. According to Le Matin (Paris), the foreign ambassadors at Constantinople have refused to modify the terms of their ultimatum to the porte reriving next week. The extremist quiring the withdrawal of the Turkish troops from Crete.

TO ESCORT THE KAISER.

Djevad Pasha, the Turkish military commander in Crete, has received orders from the sultan to proceed immediately to Constantituople in order to accompany the German emperor on the latter's journey to Syria. Chakir Pasha will assume command of the Turkish troops, succeeding Djevad

The exodus of inhabitants, Christians, Mussulmans and Jews, continues by every steamer and sailing vessel.

OPPOSITION TO BRITAIN'S PLAN A Milan newspaper publishes a report of an interview with Vice-Admiral Canevaro, minister of foreign affairs, and formerly the senior offi-cer of the foreign admirals in Crete, in which he is represented as saying that Italy, France and Russia the moral support of Germany and Austria in their wish to definitely settle the Cretan question. England, he said, wished to remain in Candia, but the other powers would not give their consent to her permanent occupa-

tion of that place. LIGHT IN THE DARKNESS.

Sir Ellis Ashmead-Bartlett, M. P., has obtained a concession from the porte for the electric lighting of Smyrna and Salonica, together with the electric traction for tramways. He was also promised the preference, if ever a similar concession was granted, for the same purpose in Constantinople.

A Brand New Emperor To Be Installed.

The Retrograde Movement Spreading-Huang Won't Go-Rebellion in Formosa.

London, Oct. 12 .- The loan contract for the extension of the Nieu Chwang Railroad, signed by the Hong Kong and Shanghai Bank, calls for \$11,250,000 at 5 per cent, guaranteed on the security of the existing lines at Pekin,

Shanghai and other places. The retrograde movement is spreading in China. Imperial edicts have been issued suppressing the native press and punishing the editors, abolishing the department of agriculture and dismissing from office all minis-

ters favoring reforms. A NEW EMPEROR. The dowager empress of China and the imperial clan, according to a special dispatch from Shanghai, have adopted as the new emperor a son of the late Emperor Tung Chi, who will shortly

be proclaimed.

A QUEER SITUATION. A special dispatch from Shanghai says: Early this morning a United States consular officer, with 30 armed members of the recently discharged Corean bodyguard, invaded the foreign bureau with the intention of releasing Huang, formerly Chinese consul at Singapore, and lately ministerdesignate of China to Japan, who was arrested on Monday by order of the dowager empress in connection with the reform movement. Huang, however, refused to go, and the party retired, crestfallen.

REBELLION. According to news from Formosa, the rebels recently attacked the government officers and set the building on fire. They fled on the approach of the troops, who subsequently attacked the rebels in the district, burning their villages and inflicting great loss.

100 African Chiefs Held for Assassinating Missionaries.

The Trolley in London-Piper Find. later's Case.

London, Oct. 12.-Native chiefs to the number of 100 have been arrested and are awaiting trial at Freetown, capital of the British colony of Sierra Leone, for the murder of American and other missionaries at Kwelu in May last. A number of the chiefs implicated have already been convicted. The rebellion in May, 1898, which led to the massacre of the missionaries of the west coast of Africa grew out of the dissatisfaction of the natives with the imposition of the hut tax, and spread through the Sherbro district, where the headquarters of the American missionaries, members of the United Brotherhood of America, are located, and where the members of the United Brotherhood of Christ were killed. The insurgents burned the mission houses and murdered a number of the American missionaries, including Mr. and Mrs. Cain and the Misses Archer, Hatfield and Scheneck. Others of the missionaries, Mr. and Mrs. Burtner, Mr. and Mrs. Minshall and

ed in escaping to Freetown. Terrible experiences were recounted by those who escaped. For three days there was awful bloodshed, while the natives were engaged in the work of massacre and destruction. A boat's crew from a British warship just reached a mission house in time to rescue Miss Muller. A number of natives frightfully besmeared with the blood of earlier victims, had already surrounded the building when the sailors appeared on the scene and rescued the women. A British expedition was subsequently dispatched to the scene of the uprising and the cremated bodies of the murdered missionaries were recovered. The British then severely punished the rebellious natives, but the search for Mrs. Cain, who fled to the bush at the time of the massacre proved fruitless, and it was con-


