D. Rizow, Minister to Berlin, Makes Concrete Proposals.

PETROGRAD, May 21-via London, June 1.-Maxim Gorky, the noted Russian author, publishes a sensational acount of an endeavor by D. Rizow, the Bulgarian minister at Berlin, to inveigle him into clandestine negotiations for a separate peace. In the Novaia Zhizn, of which Gorky is the editor, he prints Rizow's secret dispatch, occupying three columns, with concrete peace proposals, and, although he himself is an almost fanatical advocate of peace, denounces Rizow.

Rizow thereupon makes the following concrete proposal:

Russia to conclude an immediate armistice with her foes, both belligerents retaining their present fronts, and to summon immediately a Russian constituent assembly with the aim of deciding on peace or war. This, says Rizow, is the only means to save the Russian revolution from disaster. He invites Gorky to meet him at Stockholm or some other Swedish town, or, if that is impossible, to send a representative, who must be a Russian of authority. He invites Gorky to acknowledge the dispatch and appoint a meeting place by telegraph to a certain Grekoff residing it. Stockholm and suggests that he conceal his identity by signing it with his chirstian name "Alexi," or by the name "Max." In his newspaper Maxim Gorky characterizes Rizow's dispatch at base and stupid and declares that his only reply will be its publication.

MUST RULE BELGIUM. VON BISSING'S POLICY UNTIL HIS LAST HOUR

Copenhagen, Via London, June 1 .-The late Governor General Bissing of The late Governor General Bissing of Belgium maintained until the day of his death his belief in the necessity of the complete annexation of Belgium to Germany. German advocates of moderate peace have been asserting that von Bissing changed the views he expressed in the memorandum he addressed to the emperor advocating annexation. This is disproved by a letter written by you Bissing on January 14 to the Reichstag deputy, Dr. Stresemann.

In this letter General von Bissing be ruled and exploited interest. He chides thos thinkers who wish to con

"superficial thinkers who wish to content themselves with guarantees of a paper nature or who consider the Meuse line an adequate frontier, a line which can never constitute the frontier which we need."

Von Bissing goes on to say that the frontier, needed to protect Belgium against England and France, must be advanced as far as conceivable northward, and that the coast is and must be part of that frontier. The governor-general declared that his entire policy had been guided by this idea and that he had labored secretly but steadily to build up "connections" to support this program. He added that if these secret connections were maintained he hoped the time would come when Germany would be compensated through Belgium for her great sacrifices in the war.

PHONE EMPLOYEES OF MANITOBA ACCEPT THE ARBITRATORS' AWARD

Winnipeg, June 1.—The strike of the Manitoba Government telephone operators and plant men has been averted by their acceptance of the recommendations of the board of arbitration, which was submitted last evening. The employees were demanding an increase in wage rates and better working conditions, the operators asking a minimum wage of \$40 per month, and the plant men a 25 per cent increase. The finding of the board gives the operators their demands in full, while the plant men are awarded an increase of 18½ per cent. The report also recommends an eight-hour day, with two weeks' holidays each year with pay.


