LAKE ERIE EATING WAY INTO LAND AT ORCHARD BEACH YET

Further Inroads of Water
Wash Away Beach.

Lake Erie continues to "bite" into Orchard Beach, Port Stanley. In some sections of the beach more than 25 feet has been eaten away by the waves this spring. A number of cottages which last year were believed to be sufficiently far back from the lake to be out of danger, had to be moved again this spring. One summer house has fallen into the lake, and the steps built last year from Orchard Beach cliff to the beach are no longer seen.

It was hoped that the breakwater, promised by the Government, would keep the beach intact, but the breakwater has not been built, and with each succeeding spring storm, another slice of land is claimed by the lake.

Since last spring 100 feet of land has disappeared into the water, and the beach and backing land, continue to disappear rapidly.

DOMINION POLICE IN TWO DISTRICTS TOOK 111 DRAFT DODGERS

Force in London and Toronto
Areas Busy Last Week.

QUESTIONED 6,427 MEN

6,327 of These Were Released
After Interrogation by
Officers.

Reports given out by Chief Inspector Capt. Tom Flanagan, Dominion police force chief for Military Districts No. 1 (London), No. 2 (Toronto), and No. 3 (Kingston), show that during the past week there were 6,427 men questioned by the Dominion police in the London and Toronto districts. Of this number 111 were put into uniform, while 79 were handed over to the civil police to deal with. The remaining 6,237 were released after being questioned.

Contrary to the general belief, less than 1 per cent of the men questioned were from Toronto. The big centre of the two districts, the big centre of the Dominion police not only in this district, but in the entire Dominion, have been gradually extended until the whole area of both districts is being covered by the Dominion police. In the Toronto district particularly, the Dominion policemen are "working" the railway trains, and passengers on trains going into and out of the city are being asked to produce their exemption papers or marriage certificates.

KERWOOD SOLDIER WAS WOUNDED THREE TIMES

In a recent account of a reception to returned heroes has the following regarding Pte. Callaghan, son of Ed Callaghan of Kerwood:

"Included in the westbound crowd was Pte. Callaghan of the Princess Pats, who was returning to Edmonton. Pte. Callaghan, previous to enlisting, was a school teacher just outside of Edmonton, and has been considerable service with this crack battalion. He has been wounded three times, the last being at Passchendaele. Every officer in his company was killed in this action, and the casualties among the men ran very high. Pte. Callaghan stated that the whole brigade suffered very heavily in that engagement, but with a loss of his head and a squaring of his shoulders, he proudly remarked: 'The Canadians took the ridge when all others had fallen.'"

Mr. Callaghan went overseas two years ago and fought in France for eighteen months.
