Head of Military Police Transferred to West.

TWO YEARS IN WORK HERE

Major Baron Osborne, Who Leaves Next Week, Has Good Local Record.

After two years' service as assistant provost marshal in this district, Major Baron Osborne has been transferred to Military District No. 12, with headquarters at Regina, Sask. He is being succeeded by Major John Hirsch, a South African veteran and a returned officer who saw service in the present war with the 7th (British Columbia) Battalion. Major Osborne will leave next week for the West.

Major Hirsch served in South Africa with the Strathcona Regiment, and later with E Division of the South African Constabulary. Of late he has been with the Military Hospital Commission Command.

Major Osborne, after returning from France where he was with the 1st Battalion, took charge of the police of this district two years ago, and since that time he has been in charge of the police of the district so efficiently that excellent order has been maintained.

400 WAR GARDENS BEING WORKED IN EAST LONDON WARD

300 Are Those of Factory Employees of East End.

Over 400 "war gardens" will be cultivated here by the end of the month. In connection with the War Gardening Association, Ald. F. R. Watkinson has allotted more than 100 plots and applications continue to pour in. The remaining plots are being cultivated by the employees of the Military Manufacturing Company, McCormick Manufacturing Company, Beatty Bros., and other east end manufacturing plants.

Many of the plots are already planted, and this afternoon every gardener is working on the plots. Women are taking quite an interest in the movement, Ald. Watkinson says, and many plots will be cultivated by them this summer.

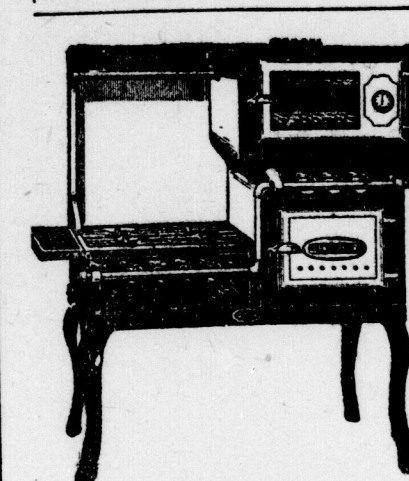

RECIPE
CORN ROAST.

One cup corn, 1 1/2 teaspoons grated onion, 1/4 cup cream, 2 eggs, 1 cup milk, 1 1/2 cups dried bread crumbs, 1 teaspoon salt. Beat eggs, add the milk, cream, corn, salt and bread crumbs. Let stand 15 to 20 minutes. Turn into a buttered pan, bake in a moderate oven 30 to 40 minutes. Serve with cream or white sauce.

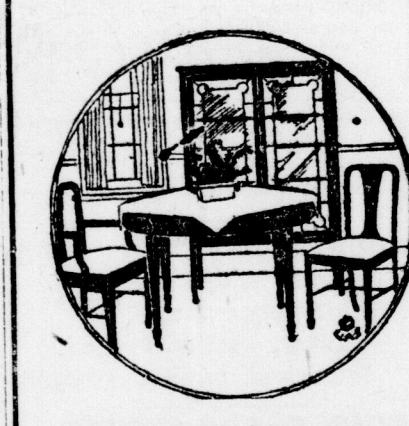
