LONDON EDITOR WHO JOINS O. A. C. STAFF AS NEW PROFESSOR

SHAREHOLDERS OF PREMIER-LANGMUIR HEAR GOOD REPORTS

Further Showing of Silver Among Valuable Baryte.

More than one hundred and fifty shareholders of the Premier-Langmuir mine met at Hyman Hall on Thursday evening, when the most glowing reports as to progress in the property were received from President McIntosh, who came down from Pulpit for the occasion.

London capital to the extent of at least \$100,000 has been invested in the mine, and operation commenced upon a sum not much larger than this in the aggregate. While there is a good deal of local activity in the stock, the company is said to have enough money to equip and operate a steady shipment of baryte is expected to commence in a few weeks.

LOCAL BRANCH OF G. W. V. A. HAS BEEN GREAT HELP TO THE NEEDY FAMILIES OF SOLDIERS

Interesting Resume of Association's Activities Since Its Formation Under Title of Returned Soldiers' Association—Gave Valuable Aid in Securing Fuel During Winter.

The increasing number of Canadian soldiers being brought back to this military district has brought the Great War Veterans' Association to the fore most prominently. An interesting history of the Returned Soldiers' Association of London, now known as the Great War Veterans' Association, London branch, has been prepared.

The Returned Soldiers' Association was formed in London on April 16, 1915, by a small body of returned soldiers who decided to form a club or association. The aims and objects of the association were to help the returned soldiers and their families, and to help the community in general.

On November 27 a Victory Bond for \$500 was purchased. On December 1, \$100 was voted to the Halifax relief fund. In December an appeal was made to the secretary for fuel because of the general shortage of coal. A committee was appointed to interview the dealer, with the result that more than 200 soldiers' families were helped. The committee also secured 500 pounds of coal, between 50 and 60 tons of coal being delivered by the G. W. V. A., as well as some five cords of hardwood. In addition, some 35 families were assisted with clothing, groceries and fuel through the efforts of the C. E. F. Returned Chapter.

Homes were provided for a number of little ones whose fathers were either overseas or returned, and whose mothers were ill. In all 11 children found foster homes.

On Dec. 19, the second annual Christmas tree was held at the armories, and only the returned soldiers' kiddies but those of all men who had been in the war were invited. More than 1,000 children were made happy on that day. The next tree will have to be a still larger one for Santa Claus was given a list from the G. W. V. A. of the children present of what they wanted next year.

During the month of January, February and March \$500 had been loaned in coal, and \$500 spent in groceries and fuel for needy families.

BIG SAVINGS IN FEEDING GARBAGE FOR HOG FATTENING

Conservation Report Commends Proposal Made Here.

Interesting facts and figures in support of the fattening of pigs on city garbage, such as has been advocated here, are given by the Canadian commission on conservation. While the question has been allowed to more or less die in London, following the retirement of ex-controller R. W. Shaw from the municipal arena, it is believed that it will be brought to the attention of the Ontario Legislature has taken steps to encourage garbage feeding.

The local proposal was to use the city garbage for feeding hogs at the hospital for the insane, where proper equipment for boiling and sterilizing garbage is already in place. It was argued that not only could bacon production be stimulated in this way, but an appreciable amount saved in the operation of the garbage system.

1600 Hogs Fattened. Saskatchewan's garbage last year fattened 1,600 hogs, according to a report of the commission on conservation. The work there is under the supervision of the health department, but the pigsties are privately owned. The report of the Saskatchewan city veterinary inspector and the health officer says in part:

"There are from 200 to 300 hogs fed all

the time, and during the past three months there were over 400 hogs fattened upon boiled garbage mixed with a small amount of grain and sold from the place. A conservative estimate would place at least 1,000 hogs fattened and marketed during the year. This is an additional source of income for the year from one small city, and all from garbage formerly removed to the incineration ground at the city's expense."

"In this city the feeding of boiled garbage to hogs according to our bylaw has proven eminently successful, and if this method were to be put into effect in every town and city in Canada, which could very easily be done, the hog production could be very greatly increased this summer."

A report of Worcester, Mass., says that 60 per cent of the city's garbage is being used for hogs at the city farm for indigent poor. Some 15 tons of garbage are collected and sold to the farm daily. Some 500 breeding sows are kept, and the total number of hogs is around 3,000. In 1914 the home farm there sold \$35,000 worth of hogs, and last year approximately \$50,000 worth. In Springfield, Mass., a changing garden reduction system to a hog farm, it is reported.
