

In returned men to help themselves. All the officers are returned soldiers, and its membership is confined to those who have left Canadian soil for the firing line in this great war. No distinction is made between officers who have served overseas and the rank and file who have done their bit. To each is given the hand of comradeship of the association upon presentation of proper credentials and an expressed desire to affiliate with other comrades.

Relief Work The Past Winter.

In December an appeal was made to the secretary for fuel because of the general shortage in London. A committee was appointed to interview the dealers, with the result that more than 200 soldiers' families received 500 pounds each, between 50 and 60 tons of coal being delivered by the G. W. V. A., as well as some five cords of hardwood. In addition, some 35 families were assisted with clothing, groceries and fuel through the efforts of the C. E. F. Returned Chempter.

Homes were provided for a number of little ones whose fathers were either overseas or returned. The first meeting of the Returned Soldiers' Association was held in the council chamber of the city hall by permission of the then mayor, Dr. H. A. Stevenson. Sergt.-Major Burdette was elected president; Sergt. Nightingale, vice-president, and the late Pte. Alex. Ritchie, secretary-treasurer. At the second meeting in the council chamber it was decided to secure rooms, not only for meetings, but for social and other gatherings and the Conservative Club was rened. The Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire offered the returned men any assistance it could, and a tag day was held and the generosity of the citizens of London was demonstrated in the \$800 which was given.
