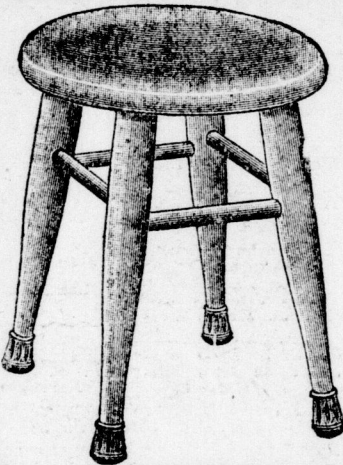

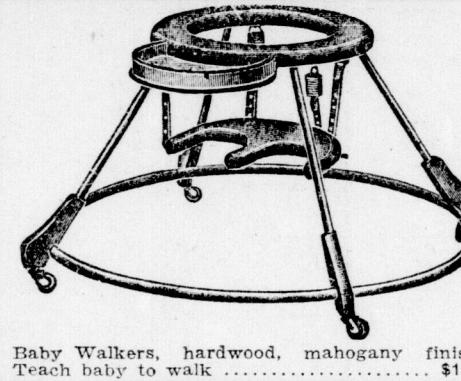

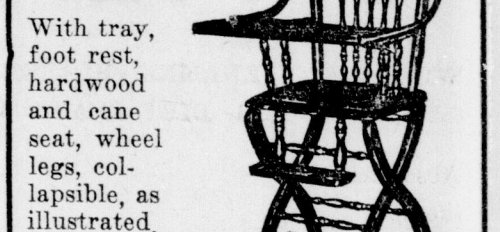

COMPULSION MAY BE USED BY GOVERNMENT TO HELP WITH CROPS

Food Controller Hanna Makes Significant Statement.

TALK TO MANUFACTURERS

Import of Certain Goods May Be Stopped That Factories May Close.

TORONTO, Aug. 2.—A significant statement was made by Hon. W. L. Hanna, Dominion food controller, today, at a meeting of manufacturers from all parts of the province, called by the organization of resources committee of Ontario, for the purpose of placing before the manufacturers the seriousness of the farm help problem and the immediate necessity of securing men to save a large part of the 1917 crop from destruction, which is feared if volunteer workers are not forthcoming within the next week or so.

"We don't want to say 'must,' if you will get the men to the farms, it is imperative, however, that every ounce of the crops shall be saved. In order to accomplish this, I am appealing to every employer of labor to release the men possible without detracting from the immediate work of war. The government desires to avoid compulsion, it is possible to obtain the services of 16,000 men voluntarily."

Factories May Close.

Mr. Hanna expressed the opinion that if employers engaged in the manufacture of certain lines of goods would prepare to close their plants, produce of those goods while their men were idle. He had the assurance of Premier Borden and Hon. J. D. Martin, minister of customs, that if such a plan was necessary in order to supply to take off the harvest an order would be issued.

Mr. Hanna stated that as food controller he was sure that he would be paid by the provincial government.

Who Pays the Shot?

Mr. Hanna stated that there were two difficulties. Men employed in factories would be on farms at a small wage, even if it went at all, and the farmers would not pay skilled industrial labor for unskilled farm labor. Who would pay the difference? It would have to be the manufacturer.

Manufacturers' special farm help plan was approved, with Senator F. R. Nicholls as chairman, and S. J. McLean as secretary.

Advertisement for Men.

Ang of the committee was held tomorrow that the Government would pay a sufficient number of men to the farmers be requested to pay them of \$45 a month, and that the Government would make the difference between the \$45 and the actual wage of the farmer, which it was paid by the farmers.

2,000 Men Needed.

It was stated that 2,000 men were needed to harvest the crop in Ontario, which was the estimate by Hon. Finlay Macdonald.

The meeting was called by the organization of resources committee of Ontario. Even police chiefs were invited to represent the Toronto force.

FISH FROM COASTS WILL BE DELIVERED FRESH IN ONTARIO

Sea Food Available on Monday Right Off the Ice.

Sea Food Available on Monday

Right Off the Ice.

OTTAWA, Aug. 2.—The first step toward the practical consummation of plans upon which the food controller of Canada and the special fish committee have been working during the last few weeks is indicated in an announcement made today. It is intended to use refrigerator cars service from both Atlantic and Pacific coastal points to facilitate distribution in Central Canada of the finest fish food.

The first car, as a test under this plan, will leave the Atlantic coast on Saturday, August 4, loaded with fresh caught Atlantic sea food. It is due to arrive in Toronto Monday morning, August 6. Negotiations with producers and transportation companies have resulted in an arrangement for a regular express refrigerator car service. The cars will be fitted with huge ice tanks, and the fish will be placed in specially constructed cases, thus assuring first-class condition upon arrival.

The first car will run directly through to Toronto, and Ontario dealers are now enabled to avail themselves of a supply of fish in first-class condition by re-shipment from Toronto.

This is the first time that Atlantic sea food has been expressed right through in refrigerator cars lots as far west as Toronto. The heavy load of passenger trains has involved difficulties heretofore. The fish committee experts to provide a car on this line weekly.

It is anticipated that the public will co-operate with this effort of the food controller by inquiring for the fish from their dealers early next week.

INCOME TAX IS READ FOR SECOND TIME IN DOMINION COMMONS

Man Cannot Deduct Losses on Real Estate From His Income.

MINORS ARE NOT EXEMPT

No Evading Taxation by Dividing Income With One's Wife.

OTTAWA, Aug. 2.—The income tax bill was given second reading tonight, and the House of Commons went to work on the proposed measure.

Long discussion upon the details and difficulties of it ensued. There was a warm exchange of views upon the subject of income from real estate holdings. Sir Thomas White expressed the opinion that, although a man might be deriving no revenue from it, but having to pay heavy municipal and provincial taxes, he should not be allowed to deduct the loss upon the real estate from his income.

The minister explained that both a husband and wife are liable to taxation on incomes. If a wife has an income of her own she is liable to assess.

Hon. Mr. Graham raised the point as to what would be done in the case of a man who had an income of \$5,000 and for the sake of evading the law would transfer half of it to his wife. He would have an income of \$2,500 and evade the tax.

Sir Thomas White thought it was improbable that such a thing would be done to any great extent. He was of the opinion, though, that there would be only one exemption for joint incomes. He promised consideration of the point.

W. F. Middleton was strongly of the opinion that where the husband and wife were living together their incomes would be combined, and there should be no exemption. He was supported in this contention by F. F. McKee of Kingston, who feared that the law by such an evasion could be made almost impossible.

C. A. Wilson, Levalle, and Hon. R. L. Lemaux did not agree with this view-point, and thought that the husband and wife should be taxed separately.

Difficult to Get At.

W. F. Middleton said that there was much doubt as to how an income would be estimated. There were many people who knew what their income was. For instance, a man might have \$50,000 in real estate, and \$25,000 in property which was vacant and which was depreciating in value. Would there be any allowance of depreciation of capital? "Income," he said, "can be eaten up rapidly by unproductive property."

He said that he kept books, and he would have difficulty in estimating his income. He thought most people would be in the same position.

Thomas White said that an income tax raised many difficult questions. It would be dangerous to say that there should be deduction for depreciation. It was impossible to get an income tax down to a mathematical nicety. He expressed the opinion that in the case of a man who held unproductive real estate, he should not be allowed to deduct the taxes on that property from his income. Taxation should not be considered.

Might Lose Heavily.

Mr. Cockshutt declared that if this was carried out to its logical conclusion, men might be paying out more than they received from their properties. Investing in properties was a legitimate enterprise. He thought also that de-

The submarine was still in possession when the crew was transferred to another steamer on June 23.
