

RANCE'S NAVAL POWER WANES. Likely Soon to Lose Second Place Germany Regarded as Enemy.

Paris, Nov. 22.-M. Bos, reporter on the naval budget, submitted his report to the chamber of deputies to-day. It is noteworthy in indicating that France still regards Germany as the enemy.

M. Bos remarks that France, whan
ever efforts she makes, will never rive
Great Britain at sea, any more that
Great Britain will be able to organiz an army as strong as that of France.

Moreover, all danger of a conflict with
Great Britain is happily at an end.
It is therefore between the German and
French navies that comparison must
be made.

his shows that four years hence the two fleets will be practically equal, but with the development of the German naval program, which extends from 1947 to 1917, the balance will be removed to

to 1917, the balance will be removed to France's disadvantage, Referring to the rapid growth of the German navy and the still more rapid growth of the American navy, M. Bos points out that France, from being the second naval power in the world, may, in the near future, become the third and perhaps the fourth power. She, however, has no aggressive de-She, however, has no aggressive de-signs on any one, and can, therefore without hatred, witness the develop ment of other navies and resign her-self to seeing the flags of other naions on the seas of the world more fre-uently than her own. Nevertheless she must not be left behind foreigners, especially Germany, to the extent of endangering her independence. She must keep her fleet powerful enough to inspire respect and to make the issue of a conflict depend on France's support or abstention.

KAISER AND SCHOOLBOY.

Frankfort, Nov. 23.—On the imperial yacht Hoheuzollern the kalser recently saw two of his guests laughing furiously at a story one of them was relating, and insisted on learning the reason of such mirth. He thus discovered that a teacher in one of the Berlin schools had set his pupils a subject for an essay, "What Ideas of the Different Hohenzollern Sovereigns Are to Be Gathered By Observing the Position of Their Legs in the Statues of Them in the Sieges Allee?"

William II, at once telegraphed to the minister of education in Berlin, instructions to procure and forward to him all the essays he could find. Three copies were thus in the emperor's possession within a few days. One of them concluded with the remark that, in the opinion of the writer, a better estimate could be formed of the Hohenzollerns from their faces than from their legs.

ing up his pen he wrote at the bottom of the essay, "Consider this the most suitable condemnation of the theme.—Wilhelm II." The essay was returned to the boy, who, needless to say, values it now exceedingly.

The race is open to the world, teams of five amateurs to compete.

The conditions are as follows: A member of each team will swim as far across Channel as he is able. Then his task will be taken up by a second man, and so on, until the opposite shore is reached. The team whose first lands wins the cup.

The race is to take place in July or August next year.
