

be removed as soon as possible to some suburban district, where sufficient grounds can be obtained for this purpose, as it is impossible for the nurses to take proper healthful exercise in a small back garden or in the crowded streets of the city. A building suitably arranged and properly ventilated is now absolutely a necessity for the good health of the children and their nurses, as in the winter especially it is impossible to ventilate the present rooms without opening the windows and causing draughts injurious to the infants.

It is unnecessary for me to refer to the attention and skill displayed by the Matron and Assistant Matron in the care of the inmates of the Home, and to whom its success is mainly due, as these are already so apparent to those who have any part in the management of the Institution.
