London, Jan. 18.—(Special)—Hon. Joseph Martin, formerly member of the Dominion parliament, carried St. Pancras East for the Liberals by a substantial majority. Richard Jebb, who opposed the regular Unionist candidate in Marylebone East, and who was endorsed by many Torontoians in a petition sent home, got 770 votes, while the successful candidate obtained 3,000 odd.

All the members of the late ministry who were voted for yesterday, retained their seats, but the majorities in every case fell. Arthur J. Balfour, former premier, holds his London seat and his colleague, Sir Frederick Balfour, was also elected. The most notable Unionist gain was at Portsmouth, where Lord Charles Beresford and his colleague, Fells, routed the Laborite candidate. The seat was formerly Liberal.

The laborites were hard hit by the defeat of Will Crooks, one of their foremost champions, in Woolwich, Steadman, the other laborite, was defeated by Major Archer Shee, whose wife is a daughter of Alfred Pell of New York.

Liberals are deplored the defeat, at Hamilton, of Chas. Munn, one of the party's most effective speakers. Lord Cecil and G. Stewart Bowles, who ran as free trade Unionists, failed in their attempt to oust Philip Snowden.

Interest in Liverpool Today. (Associated Press) London, Jan. 18.—Complete returns from yesterday's elections for members of parliament make the standing of the parties as follows: Government Coalition Liberals 79; Labor 17; Irish Nationalists 16; Opposition Unionists 96; total Unionist gain 30.

Immense interest attaches today to Liverpool whose nine divisions are polling to-day. T. P. O'Connor, Nationalist, for the Scotch division is regarded as invincible. F. E. Smith a tariff reform stalwart was having a hard fight in the Walton division while the Unionists were talking of defeating the Right Hon. J. E. B. Seely, under secretary of the colonies in the Abercromby division.

Keir Hardie, labor candidate for Merthyr Tydfil was among the interesting persons whose anxieties were over today.
