Aim and method of teaching.

The Seminary is conducted by experienced priests both in classical and commercial education. Its object is to impart such a general education as may fit young men for any calling in after life. It combines therefore the manifold advantages of a christian education with those of a thorough commercial and classical course.

The *Commercial Course* may be followed either for its own sake, or as preparatory for the Classical Course. It is completed in three years, and comprises the English and French languages, Arithmetic, Penmanship, Book-keeping, linear Drawing, Geography, History, general outlines of Geometry, Banking, Music and Telegraphy. Diplomas are conferred on those who pass a satisfactory examination on all branches connected with practical commerce. The Board of Examiners, appointed by the Superintendent of Public Instruction in the Province of Quebec, is actually composed of two Bank Cashiers, an Accountant, the Principal of the Seminary, and the Professor of the Business Class. The positions now occupied by the former graduates and the continued patronage of the public in general fully testify to the worth of those diplomas.

There is, moreover, a Preparatory Class for younger students.

The *Classical Course*, principally taught in French, is designed to impart a thorough knowledge of the Greek, Latin, English and French languages and Literature; Mathematics, History, Geography, Philosophy, Natural Sciences, and Music. The Seminary being affiliated to Laval University, Quebec, since 18th December 1878, its alumni, after due examination, are entitled to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Literature and Bachelor of Sciences.

On entering, each student is examined and placed in the different classes for which his previous acquirements
