CARLETON LAD WINS THE D.C.M.

Sergeant James C. Stackhouse Distinguished Himself

Member of Major Magee's Battery Handled Well Situation That Arose When Shell Cap in Gun Exploded

That Sergeant James C. Stackhouse, son of Mrs. C. J. Stackhouse of 57 Market Place, West St. John, a member of the No. 1 Heavy Battery, is to be decorated with the D. C. M., first for accurate stung up of the situation when

he found that a shell cap had exploded, secondly, ordering the gun crew to safety; thirdly, depressing the gun to prevent injury to traffic on the road, and fourthly, his gallantry in remaining beside the gun, was the news received from Captain C. F. Inches, O. C. of the battery by Mrs. Stackhouse yesterday. The letter follows—

"You will be glad to know that the G. O. C. in chief has, under authority granted by His Majesty the King, awarded to your son, Sergeant James C. Stackhouse of this battery, a Distinguished Conduct Medal for a gallant act which was reported to headquarters as follows—

September 6—This morning at five o'clock this N. C. O. was in action in charge of D. sub-section gun. Time shrapnel was the projectile in use. The gun was being loaded. He examined the fuse setting and found it correct. As the shell was being rammed home he heard a noise which he described as sounding like the explosion of a cap. He instinctively depressed the gun by withholding the cartridge, ordered the gun crew to 'cover, depress the gun in order that anything that might go out the muzzle would go into the ground and not endanger traffic on a road a short distance in front of the gun and, leaving the breech open, took up a position beside the gun wheel.

When the shell burst, the head and bullets ploughed into the ground in front of the gun; the case of the shell flew back through the breech. An alternative to the action adopted by Sergeant Stackhouse would have been to load the shell, but any delay, such as often happens in the procedure, would have been disastrous to gun and personnel. If the shell did get safely away it would have burst within our own lines.

There are four points to emphasize. First, accurate sighting up of the situation; secondly, riding the gun crew to safety; thirdly, depressing the gun to prevent injury to traffic on the road, and fourthly, his gallantry in remaining beside the gun.

Perhaps, in explanation of the above, I should point out that, normally, the fuse does not commence to burn until the gun is fired.
