Shooting Battle At Squatter's Hut

Sheriff of Queens County, N. Y. and Squatter Killed and Three Policemen Wounded; Siege of An Hour

New York, Oct. 25.—Sheriff Paul Stier of Queens county, was shot and instantly killed and three policemen were wounded when the sheriff attempted to execute a warrant of arrest issued for Frank Taff, who for eighteen years has lived as a squatter on the old John D. Locke farm at Whiteston Landing, Long Island. The squatter, known by many persons in the community to have always been eccentric, was finally killed on top of his shanty, where for an hour and twenty minutes he had kept at bay a posse including nearly forty policemen and deputies.

Here is a list of the dead and injured: Sheriff Paul, sheriff of Queens county, shot in the left lung and instantly killed; Taff, Frank, shot in the head and instantly killed; Fitzgerald, James, police sergeant, Flushing, shot in left leg; Durkin, John, patrolman, Flushing, shot in the neck, left hip and back; Kerrigan, John, patrolman, shot in the left leg and back.

Taff was armed with a repeating shotgun and two 22-calibre rifles. His ammunition consisted of 150 shells for use in the shotgun and more than 250 rounds for the small calibre rifles. Thus supplied, he held his stronghold on the roof of his hut against the two score policemen who had only their revolvers, which they found ineffective against the surer aim of the insane squatter.

After killing the sheriff and wounding one of the policemen who first entered the house with the sheriff, Taff took a defensive stand. The police tried to induce him to surrender. He refused, and they at last were forced to shoot. He returned shot for shot, until the police re-

Had the difficulty of fighting the squatter with revolvers. It was with this weapon that he shot Taff dead on the roof of his shanty.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

The C. P. R. strike, declared off yesterday afternoon, was settled following a conference of representatives of the trainmen and the road. The settlement means a complete victory for the men. They will now receive an increase in wages of two cents per man an hour. The local men were ready to go out when word came.

Hon. Frank Cochrane, accompanied by P. P. Chabot, arrived in Montreal last night after a trip of inspection over the C. G. R. R., which included St. John. As a result of the inspection the C. G. R. R. will handle one-fourth more of the war material.

R. A. Fringle, K. C., formerly a member for Stormont and now one of the most famous lawyers in Ottawa, which he declined the vacancy in the high court bench of Ontario.

Legislation which the government proposes to take to deal with the rapid increase in the cost of living was outlined yesterday. Each municipality will have full power in its own constituency to hold investigations into any advance in foodstuffs. It is thought that the fear of publicity will prevent any illegal advance in prices. Any information along these lines the government will readily investigate.

The New Elevator. Efforts are being made to arrange for the completion of the new half million dollar elevator for the C. G. R. R. at Reed's Point by spring time. The first step will be the construction of a spur track in the work. The contractors, Engineers & Contractors, Ltd., are bringing a large amount of equipment from Montreal, where they have just completed a big bridge across the river. The work will be in charge of E. H. Reid of Annapolis, a member of the firm. The plans call for an excavation fifteen feet deep, 100 feet long and 60 feet broad. The building is to be 200 feet high, the first eighty-five feet of concrete and the rest of structural steel. The contracts for the superstructure have not been awarded yet.
