

PRESIDENT SUSPENDER NONE SO EASY


THE COMMON COUNCIL Apart from the presentation of the mayor's annual report little business was seen up at the meeting of the common council yesterday afternoon.



Paris, April 21—A revolution in music is foreshadowed by the discovery of a French engineer, M.
