

TOOK 24 DAYS TO EXTRICATE FROZEN PLANE

Tenacity of Amundsen And Companions Saved Them

RAN INTO MIST

Half Gasoline Was Exhausted When They Were Compelled to Land

Canadian Press. OSLO, June 20.—Captain Amundsen, and his five fellow explorers, will have an enthusiastic welcome, when they arrive here, on their return from their perilous airplane expedition into the Arctic.

STORY OF FLIGHT

Published non-copyrighted accounts of the flier's experiences say they encountered a fog soon after starting from King's Bay, Spitzbergen, on May 21. Rising above the mist they held to their course for some hours, until compelled to alight because half their gasoline was exhausted. Then when it seemed they had found safety in a piece of open water, where the seaplanes alighted, they were suddenly confronted with catastrophe. The ice closed in, immovably jamming both machines. Without immediate means of transportation, stranded amidst a limitless waste of water, and ice, the circumstances were such as to cause dismay, but Amundsen and his companions proved equal to the emergency. With the greatest of exertion, calling for every ounce of courage, muscle and

determination, they succeeded in dislodging the effort cost 24 days of exhausting work, during which their rations were rapidly disappearing and the prospects of a safe return seemingly dwindling. Courage and perseverance won through, and at length, discarding all the equipment they could spare, and with only enough gasoline and food to take them back, provided there was no further trouble, they entrusted themselves to the air, heading for Spitzbergen.




