Mack Got Running Start.

Seven years ago, while the White Sox

were playing an exhibition game with

the Vernon Club in San Diego, Cal., a

little Mexican boy sneaked along the

White Sox bench, slipped Ray Schalk's

new glove up under his shirt, and started

on a lope for the Mexican quarter of the

village. He was pursued by Frank

(Stubby) Mack, who returned the glove

to Schalk. Seven years later it was

last week in Boston—young Mack made

his debut as a major league pitcher, with

Schalk as his battery mate.

While a boy of fifteen Mack was as-

sistant to the ground-keeper at San

Diego. The Vernon Club used to train

there, and Mack received a salary of

\$2.50 a week. The White Sox were

training at Paso Robles, Cal., in 1915,

and, as there was an exposition in San

Diego, the team went there to play a

series of three games with the Vernon

Club. That was how young Mack hap-

pened to become acquainted with Schalk.

Then Mack went to high school in San

Diego and started as a pitcher. After

being graduated, he went to St. Mary's

College in Oakland, the cradle of big

league players on the Pacific Coast. It

was there that Harry Hooper, Dutch

Leonard, Duffy Lewis, Louis Guiston,

Harry Crouse, Eddie Burns and many

other big leaguers began to show.

Mack continued to improve, and event-

ually wound up in minor league base-

ball, pitching for the Calgary team of

the Western Canadian League last year

and this year breaking in with Seattle of

the Pacific Coast League. He was watch-

ed by Danny Long, who has sent many

fine players to Charles Comiskey. Long

became interested in him, and finally

landed him for the White Sox.

Moran Digs Out Phenoms.

Pat Moran has always been known as

a manager who has been notably suc-

cessful in obtaining good baseball talent

from the ranks of the minor leagues,

and this is particularly true of the lead-

er of the Cincinnati Reds this season. At

the end of the last pennant campaign

Moran traded his star third baseman,

Heinie Kroh, to the Giants, and he also

disposed of infielder Larry Kopf and

Pitcher Rube Marquard to the Braves,

but he has succeeded in plugging up his

line-up with high-class youngsters, and

also the veteran George Burns, who

came to the Reds in the deal that sent

Groh to New York.

Moran was forced to use Pinelli at

third base and Caveney at shortstop at

the start of the present season, and both

of these young players have performed

in sensational style all year. Both of

them were obtained from the Pacific

Coast League. Pinelli had a trial with

the Detroit Tigers in 1920, but was sent

back to the Coast at the end of that

season. While Caveney was on the in-

jured list early this season Moran

brought to light another highly capable

youngster, Kimbick by name, whom he

had obtained from the Blue Ridge

League.

Early last year Moran signed Pete

Donohue, the Texas collegian, and the

latter has already developed into one of

the best right-handed pitchers in the

National League. Back in 1915, when

Moran was manager of the Philadelphia

Club, he picked up Dave Bancroft just

at the time when he was badly in need

of a capable shortstop, and the present

captain of the Giants immediately de-

veloped into a star. It was the great

playing day of that season that season

that clinched the National League pen-

nant for the Phillies.
