The Modern Game.

A tendency to think, as one grows older, that things are not done as well as they used to be was refuted in the Scottish poet's description of the games before King James at Stirling. So, too, any such doubts were dispelled from the minds of old Varsity football captains, dating back to 1875, who at the invitation of the present committee saw the game on Saturday with Queen's. Their own team did not win, but at least, with the American poet, they can "sing the hymn of the conquered" in reasonable hope of a different result on another day.

The game itself and all its attending circumstances were far beyond anything of the early times. For some of the old-timers the order in a scrimmage was "heads up" or "huck it through," and when the big push failed, to scramble a scrum was a job tedious for both players and spectators. Canadians want action in their games, as in lacrosse and hockey, which are distinctly national. And so college football has drifted away from the original rugby, the numbers a side have been reduced, and the rules changed to make the play faster and more interesting. Saturday's lively game could be the result only of careful and intelligent practice, and required the players to be in the condition physically. The old-timers may have been surprised at the number of trainers with swabs and bandages and black satchels of bandages and liniment for injuries. They had no such luxuries, and perhaps counted themselves that they were a harder race. But the greatest surprise was the number and enthusiasm of the spectators. GOLF PLAYED IN SAVANNAH IN 1811

Although modern in its phraseology, the foregoing invitation was issued more than 110 years ago by officers of the Savannah "Golf Club." It appeared in the form of an advertisement in the Savannah Museum, a newspaper bearing the date of November 25, 1811, a copy of which has just been found in the files of the Savannah Historical Society. Discovery followed the introduction of golf into the United States, which placed the date somewhere around 1860.

SCHAEFER IS SURE TO PLAY IN OPENER

Champion Opponent in the First Match of 18.2 Title Tourney to be Named Later.

New York, Nov. 4.—While it has been definitely decided that Jake Schaefer as the world's champion is entitled to the privilege of playing in the first game of the international 18.2 billiard tournament at the Hotel Pennsylvania, Nov. 18 to 21 inclusive, his opponent in that match has not yet been decided upon. It is practically certain, however, that in the first three matches of the tourney the three American players will meet the three European contestants for premier honors. Just how the pairings will be made has not yet been definitely decided. It has not been determined whether the draw will be seeded or whether it will be blind.

R. B. Benjamin, manager of Willie Hoppe, former champion, has suggested that the three Americans should be paired with the three foreigners in the first three games and that the pairing be made blind. In other words, the names of Erich Hagelacher, Roger Conti and Edouard Hogenmans should be placed in a hat, the first withdrawn to play Schaefer, the second to play Hoppe and the third to play Cochran.

In this way it would be assured that Schaefer, Hoppe and Cochran would be seen in the first three games of the tournament. There after the arrangement of the schedule would depend upon the results of the games. On the other hand, it is understood that some of the other players favor the seeded draw. The matter is now being considered, and will be decided within the next few days when the schedule for the first three games will be announced by the Brunswick-Balke-Collender Co., Company, donor of the \$1,000 championship medal and \$8,000 in cash.

In the meantime advance reservations for tickets are being received in each mail. The seating arrangements have been completed and provide for 1,500. The tickets will be ready for distribution about Nov. 6. The applications will be filled in the order in which they are received.

WHAT IS A CORD OF WOOD?

It is Usually One-Quarter What the Customer Expects.

An authoritative statement as to just what constitutes a cord of wood has been issued by the New York State College of Forestry at Syracuse, N. Y.

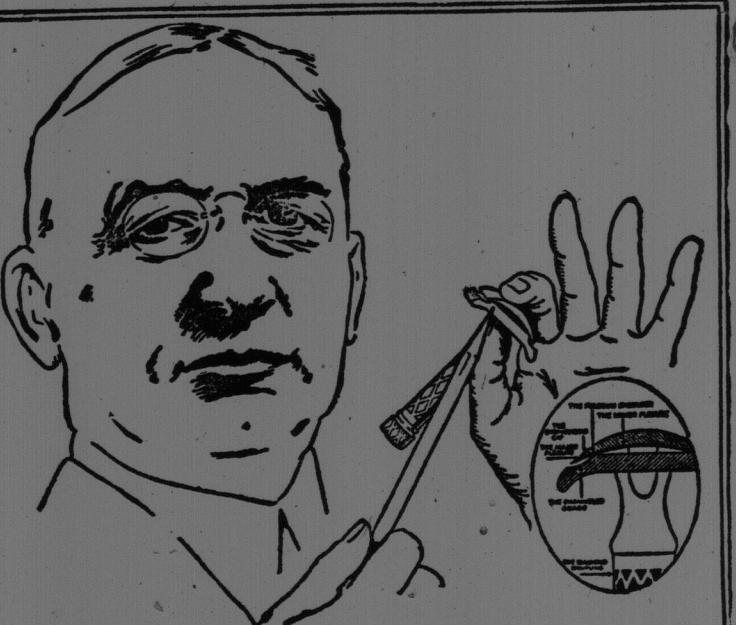
A standard cord of wood contains 128 cubic feet and is four feet wide, four feet high and eight feet long, says the statement. In buying a cord of wood the average consumer obtains a shorter length—twelve inches long. This sort of cord, which is only one-quarter of a standard cord, usually costs more in proportion to the quantity purchased than would be paid for the four-foot wood or standard cord.

This is due to the fact that it requires about as much labor to cut one-fourth of a cord of one-foot lengths as it does to cut a full cord of four-foot lengths. The customer would find it cheaper if he purchased a standard cord, provided that he has the necessary storage space and means of cutting it. Four-foot lengths into one-foot lengths. Low-priced wood, also, usually consists of slabs and other mill waste. High-priced wood is well-seasoned hardwood, which contains greater heating value. A standard cord of seasoned hardwood contains about as many heat units as a ton of coal, but a present price is only twice as much as coal and probably would be undesirable, except as a supplementary fuel.
