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FRENCH WARRING WITH TRIBESMEN

Using Army of 25,000 to Subdue Fanatical Taza People in French Morocco.

Taza, French Morocco, May 7.—A French army of 25,000 has begun a campaign against the warlike tribe of the Beni Bousett as one phase of the pacification of the Taza tribesmen which commenced on April 12. The French troops in four columns surprised the lower end of a rebellious rounded the middle Atlas Mountains, before the end of the line.

Heavy action has been reported, but the extent of the casualties has not been reported. The French are prepared for a hard campaign as the unconquered tribes always have fought with fanatical enthusiasm.
