New Haven, Conn., June 28.—Joe

star, will be head coach of the Yale

head coach for the last few years, will
retire after tomorrow's game with
Princeton at the Yankee Stadium in
New York, and Wood will succeed him
immediately. Tommers has accepted
a position as athletic director in the
Milford School.

BUTTON CAUSES EXPLOSION.

Friction Ignites Naphtha in Cleaning
Plant and Two Women Are Hurt.

New York, June 28.—A spark from
the friction of a clothes button against
the side of a naphtha filled tumbler
caused an explosion in the plant of the
New York Cleaning and Dyeing
Company, which injured two women
and shattered several windows. The
tumbler, in a corrugated iron shed, was
used as a revolving drencher.

The concussion demolished the shed
and Police Reserves from the Clinton
Street Station, two ambulances and
fire apparatus were sent to the scene.

Miss Margaret Matthews, 29 years

old, of Port Richmond, S. I., a pregar
on the second floor of the plant, frac-
tured her skull and lacerated an eye
and arm when, panic stricken she
leaped from a window into the street.
She was taken to Gouverneur Hospi-
tal where her condition was said to be
serious.

Miss Ella Kunes, 30, of 2181 Grant
Avenue, Bronx, was treated for shock
suffered in the excitement. Five others
at work in the plant escaped injury.
