Black Wins Professional

Ottawa, Aug. 29—Dave Black, of the
Shaughnessy Heights Club, Vancouver
(B. C.), formerly of Rivermead, won the
professional golf championship of Can-
ada on Saturday in the annual tourna-
ment of the professional golfers' as-
sociation held over the course of the Royal
Ottawa Club. Black, a victor of several
representatives of nearly every other
club in Canada. The Vancouver
professional reached the height of his
form, and turned in a remarkable score
of 185 for the two rounds of medal play,
being three shots lower than his nearest
competitor, George Ayton, of Regina,
and thirteen better than the third man,
K. Marsh, of London. Black, in addi-
tion to winning the dominion profes-
sional championship, also carried off the
P. D. Ross challenge cup.

May Cancel Next Meet.

It was announced by the management
of the Maritime Racing Association last
night that there is a possibility that the
meet announced for Moosepath during
the exhibition period may be cancelled.
Even under the most favorable weather
conditions possible, last week's meet
barely earned expenses, notwithstanding
reports current to the contrary, and
possibility of less attractive conditions for
the next meet created a situation which
called for careful consideration. One of
the chief handicaps is the distance of
the track from the city and the lack of
adequate transportation facilities. It was
said by the track management that the
company might do with an exhibition
period of the service promised for Sat-
urday, and they were doubtful whether
they could do so. The exhibition period

Canadian Champion Third.

Olympic Stadium, Antwerp, Aug. 29
(By Canadian Associated Press)—
George Vernot, of Montreal, dominion
champion swimmer, was third in the
final on Saturday for the 400 metre
stroke contest, which was won by Nor-
man Ross, of the United States. His
time was 5 minutes 26 4-5 seconds, while
Vernot's swimming greatly impressed
the experts, who predict a great future
for him.

U. S. Swimmers Win.

Antwerp, Aug. 29—The United States
swimmers won the final of the 600 metre
swimming relay race here today creating
a new Olympic record of 10 minutes
42 2-5 seconds. The team was composed
by Duke Kahanouku, Honolulu; Nor-
man Ross, Illinois; A. C. Perry, Mc-
Gillbury, Illinois; A. C. and R. Keolaha,
Honolulu.

The Australian team finished second,
and the English team third. The old
Olympic record 16 minutes 11 1-5 seconds
was made by the Australian team in the
Stockholm Olympics of 1912.

The final heat of the 400 metre relay
won by the United States team. The
team hung up a new Olympic record for
the event.
