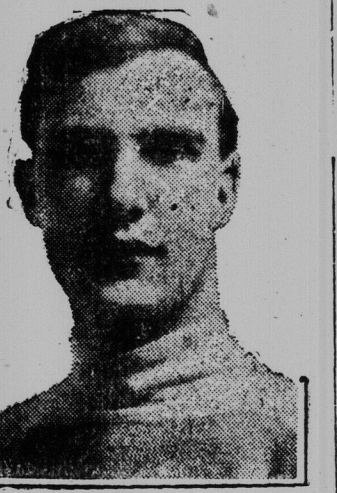
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## TO REJOIN QUEBEC.

## ARCHIE WALSH FINISHES LAST

More Than 100 Pins Behind Whalen in Championship Tournament  
Portland, Me., Dec. 5.—Jimmy Whalen, of Cambridge, Mass., won the second lap of ten strings in the forty-string candlepin match for the New England title rolled here last night. Whalen finished thirty-five pins ahead of Paul Pochler of Severe, having a total of 1,114. Pochler bowled 1,079, Peter Pride, of this city, 1,050 and Archie Walsh, of Malden, Mass. 1,018.

Whalen, who also won the first ten strings rolled in Boston, has a total of 2,272 for the twenty strings. Pochler 2,187, Pride 2,126 and Walsh 2,048. Tonight's scores:

## AUSTRIA BEGS ALLIES HELP

Vienna, Dec. 8.—Dr. Carl Renner, the chancellor, has been notified by the supreme council at Paris that it is willing to receive him personally to plead his country's dangerous plight. He will beg for immediate help, proposing as alternative the retirement of the present government and the election by the Allies of a neutral dictator and administrative staff to govern the country.

## BIG SEASON FOR THE LUXENBURG FISHERMEN

Halifax, Dec. 8.—The catch of the Luxembourg fishing fleet in the summer and autumn trips amounts to 476,875 quintals. Of this 268,750 quintals was the catch of the hand-liners and 208,125 trevellers. At \$12 a quintal, the ruling price out of the vessel, the value to the fishermen is \$5,722,500. In no year has this been surpassed.
