admitted to No. 7 General Hospital, France, suffering from gunshot wounds in shoulder and hip. On all three previous occasions when Private Kennedy was reported wounded none was serious enough to get him a "Blighty" although all forced him to go out of the lines and back to hospital in France.

Private Kennedy is twenty-two years of age and enlisted with the 140th Battalion. Upon arrival in England he crossed to France and joined the Princess Pats where he has served since November, 1916. He is an only child. Private Marshall Wounded.


