THE TELE-RAPHONE. THE LATEST INVENTION IN USE IN CANADA. The Telephonograph, which enables the user of telegraphing and telephoning has been adopted by the Michigan Central Road. The system is already in operation between Chicago and Detroit, 111 miles, and between Chicago and Michigan City. The entire system will be completed as soon as possible. The apparatus used at both the sending and receiving ends is of the same design. Each set of instruments is paid for by the user. The Railway World regards the service as of great advantage to the operating department of a railroad. If an operating official in Detroit wants to communicate with an official in another city he touches a button in his office and the bell rings in the distant office of the other official. The conversation then is carried over the telegraph wire, while the telegraph operator at the same time transmits the message.

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THE SMALL FRUIT PRODUCTION

Weather Has Been Very Favorable and the Crops Large This Season.

This has been a season very favorable to the production of small fruits. As an evidence of this, a well known grower, Mr. G. H. Buckell, of Springfield, who has been visiting Ingersoll for the past few years, drew the attention of the Chronicle reporter to the fact that berries are now retailing at a price a quarter higher than in former years. The price was seldom known to drop below five cents per box. The abundant crop Mr. Buckell stated was responsible for the low price. The weather so far, it is claimed by fruit growers has been perfect for the double berry. Mr. Buckell has been engaged in fruit growing for a number of years and it will be remembered that last year he was one of the principal speakers at the "Farmers' Institute" meetings held in this section. "There is much to learn and much hard work about the fruit business," remarked Mr. Buckell. "There are all sorts of pests to contend with, and if the season is not a favorable one your work will be in vain." Mr. Buckell at the present time has about ten acres of fruit. Of this acreage considerable is occupied by the black raspberries, which he has been very successful in raising. He also has a large strawberry patch and much of this fruit finds its way into Ingersoll homes each season. Mr. Buckell having a number of permanent customers. Spraying being so actively engaged in the growing of fruit he was one of the first in his section to treat his fruit. He has followed it for some time and is thoroughly satisfied that it is the means of producing a higher quality of fruit, especially in apples. Farmers were hard caught this season owing to the scarcity of labor, and in his own case Mr. Buckell said he has been prevented from doing the spraying that he would like to have done.

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NOTES AND COMMENTS.

CONTROLLING LICENSED HOUSES. (Toronto Globe.)

It is significant and suggestive that so many houses licensed to sell intoxicating liquors require, in the interests of public morals, the strictest inspection and the firmest control. There are hotels that are carefully kept, and hotelmen whose sense of public duty and responsibility is sound and keen and every intelligent and impartial observer, even the most uncompromising anti-prohibitionist, knows that the retail sale of liquor in public houses very frequently creates conditions inimical to the best interests of the community. It is because of these, resultant conditions that the sale is under license and that large powers of control are given to the commissioners. It being made tolerably clear that a Board of License Commissioners has the power to enforce the strictest control, it is not altogether surprising that the commission should have been carried on in a manner which has been successful in closing up certain hotels, both in city and village, which were in a state of decay and which, with indifferent success, had been made to check and abate the evil, but with indifferent success. The decision of the Court of Appeal, in sustaining the action of the Ontario license commissioners in forbidding altogether all forms of card-playing in licensed houses within their district, shows what almost absolute authority the local commissioners have. Not only did the court dismiss the appeal, but Mr. Justice Ferguson, in his opinion, stated that the license commissioners should have such powers. They were to deal with the matter, without such powers, would be almost impossible to obtain evidence sufficient to secure any conviction under any license conditions for any purpose in licensed hotels may now be prohibited by the local Board of License Commissioners. 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FOUGHT FIRE IN '49 IN LONDON TOWN

Mr. Peter Kennedy Supplies Some Information on Old Times There.

The fact was briefly noted in the Chronicle yesterday that in his early years Peter Kennedy was a resident of London, and a gallant fire fighter being a member of one of the first hook and ladder companies of that place. In a communication which appeared in yesterday's Free Press, Mr. Kennedy himself refers to those days. The following letter, which was recently received by President McLean, of the Old Boys Association, may be especially interesting to citizens of the old regime. The writer, now residing in Ingersoll, is one of the men who helped to build London up (as well as helped it from being burnt down) in the early days. While in the city he followed the trade of carpenter and was one of the men employed by Craig & Campbell in building the City Hall. He says:— "Dear Sir,—I see by the Free Press of the 25th a communication with a veteran of the old London fire brigade, and more especially of the hook and ladder company, a company I have the honor to belong to from about 1849 till 1856, when I left the city for Ingersoll, my home ever since. I remember the principal men who were my comrades at that date—Capt. A. Moffat, (first lieutenant), John Durand, my bench mate, John Craig, Alexander Campbell, A. Purdon, Jas. Dods, Jas. Owen and W. Nicholson. All these fine fellows have since gone to their long home. "If nothing happens I will go and see what is left of the ground old comrades. I myself rose to the high grade of sergeant of the crew. Wishing you all success and a good time. Yours, very truly, PETER KENNEDY."

WILL ATTEND BIG REUNION. Although no formal organization has taken place, there are many former residents of London residing here who have declared their intention of attending the Old Boys reunion next week. It is quite probable that the majority of those who desire to attend some manner of making their presence readily known in the vast throng of badges, of course, would be the proper paper.

FOUND SKELETON OF UNKNOWN VICTIM Had Laid in Lonely Spot Near Highland Creek for Over a Year. Toronto, August 1.—Mr. Charles Thompson, a farmer of the vicinity of Highland Creek, has found in an unexplored portion of his property the skeleton of a full grown man, the discovery of which may lead to startling disclosures. The bones were found in a fence which has yet been only partly cleared of trees and undergrowth. Some clothes were found near the body, but they were separated from the weather and overgrown with moss that it will be impossible to see them as a means of identification. The skeleton was found in a hole in the ground, and Mr. Thompson has reported his find to the county police, and investigations are being conducted with a view to finding if possible who the unfortunate person was, and how he met his death. From the appearance of the bones, it is thought that they have lain exposed for at least a year, and it is two years since anyone has been known to have visited the spot. At that time, Mr. Thompson and some of his sons began to clear the land, which being some distance from the highway, were seldom if ever visited. It is quite possible that the skeleton belongs to some one who has wandered off into the bush and met with some mishap.
