THE CRISIS IN SPAIN

Break Between the Vatican and Government Is Possible.

RIOT IS FEARED ON SUNDAY

Determination of the Clerical Party to Hold Popular Demonstrations In Madrid and Other Centres Is Expected to Cause Bloodshed Between the Two Factions—The Papal Nuncio Ready to Go.

Rome, Aug. 5.—Monsignor Vico, the papal nuncio to the Spanish court, was given instructions from the Vatican to be ready to leave Madrid at a moment's notice, in case of an unfavorable issue to the negotiations.

This preparation for a complete rupture of diplomatic relations between Spain and the Vatican would indicate that little is hoped from the answer which Cardinal Merry del Val is now drafting. Although the Vatican is earnestly trying its best to avoid a complete break with Spain, Cardinal Merry del Val fears that Senator Canalejas, the Spanish Premier, will be forced, in order to satisfy his extreme supporters, to still further neuter his anti-Catholic policy, and the cardinal is preparing for the worst.

The Giornale d'Italia publishes an interview with Cardinal Vico, who describes Premier Canalejas as "a terrible man," adding that it is impossible that King Alfonso approves his anti-clerical policy.

Cardinal Vannutelli goes on to point out that the King is a fervent Catholic by sentiment and tradition, but that he is too young to grapple with the situation and he has been seriously embarrassed.

With reference to the report that the King of Portugal is to visit the

King of Italy in 1911, thus disregarding the prohibition of the Vatican, Cardinal Vannutelli considers this most unlikely, as Portugal has just appointed a representative to the Holy See.

May Be a Red Sunday.

Madrid, Aug. 5.—A renewed and formal prohibition of the proposed manifestation of the clerical forces at San Sebastian, the summer capital, next Sunday, was issued yesterday by the Minister of the Interior. The organizers of the demonstration nevertheless persist in their plans and as the Republican leaders are arranging an anti-clerical demonstration at San Sebastian on the same day, great apprehension prevails.

The civil authorities are considering legal prosecutions against the organizers of the proposed Catholic manifestations and troops are in readiness to enter the summer capital at any time.

Britain's Power Questioned.

The Harems, Aug. 5.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—Dealing with the first question before the tribunal as to the right of the United States to have regulations made for fisheries, Elhu Root said that the two nations approached this subject from entirely different points of view. Great Britain approached it from the standpoint of her sovereignty, while the States did so from their guaranteed right.

It was for the tribunal to draw the line between what is competent for Great Britain to do in the exercise of her sovereign power and what was incompetent for Great Britain to do with respect to the modification of American treaty rights.

He contended these rights could not be restricted or destroyed by regulations made by one who gave the rights, nor could the grantor alone be allowed to say what was reasonable, fair, appropriate and necessary for fisheries which the United States claimed have been admitted to share in.

Insuring King George.

London, Aug. 5.—The Canadian Associated Press learns that recently there has been a very large increase in the number of life policies on King George at Lloyd's. The policies are taken for two years.

Wheat Cutting at Brandon.

ACCUSES SHERMAN

Senator Includes Vice-President in Bribery Charge.

HE IS THE MAN HIGHER UP

Thomas P. Gore, the Blind Oklahoma, Declares That Men Interested In a Land Deal Offered Him \$25,000 to \$50,000 If He Would Help Attorney to Get a Three-Million-Dollar Fee For Deal.

Muskogee, Okla., Aug. 5.—What happened in the private office of United States Senator Thomas P. Gore of Oklahoma, at Washington at noon last May 6th, formed the basis of sensational charges, involving the names of Vice-President Sherman, Senator Charles Curtis of Kansas, Congressman B. S. McGuire of Oklahoma and others, in a hearing before a special Congressional investigating committee here yesterday.

During the thirty or forty minutes of a conference held in that office, Senator Gore testified that he was approached by Jacob L. Hamon, former chairman of the Oklahoma territorial Republican committee and also former chairman of the Oklahoma State Republican committee, and that he was offered a bribe of \$25,000 or \$50,000 to remove certain legislation pending in Congress, so that \$3,000,000 might be paid to J. P. McMurray, an attorney of McAllister, Okla., and his associates.
